

## LIBERALS CHARGE LISTS ARE PADDED

Most of 6,423 Added Voters  
Are Dead, Says Candidate.

Toronto, Oct. 1.—Objection has been filed with divisional registrars by Joseph Singer, Liberal candidate in Toronto West riding, protesting against the inclusion in the voters' lists of the names of 6,423 persons. Mr. Singer declared at a political meeting last night that his canvassers had ascertained that practically every case the person had left the house in which he was registered, or is dead.

## GODERICH REORGANIZES MILITIA HOME TRAINING

Goderich, Oct. 1.—Militia home training will be renewed with the reorganization of A company of the first Huron regiment, under the command of Major A. F. Sturdy. Sections are also organized for training of signallers, Lewis gunners and stretcher-bearers. A ten-week program has been arranged, with two nights weekly for training. At the conclusion of the course an inspection will be held by the officer commanding military district number one.

For the past two years this method of training has been employed by the regiment instead of summer camp training, and the results proved satisfactory as shown by good inspections. Uniforms have already been issued to those who previously trained, and a call for recruits posted.

## LONDON WOMAN PASSES IN STRATFORD HOSPITAL

Mrs. Jemima Gough Came  
From Scotland 72 Years  
Ago.

Stratford, Oct. 1.—Mrs. Jemima Gough, who had been living with her son, W. W. Gough, London, died in the General hospital here, this morning.

Mrs. Gough, who was 78 years of age, was a former resident of Stratford. She had been visiting John Doring and other friends in the vicinity of Amulree, when she became ill, and was brought to the hospital last night. She was born in Scotland, and came to this continent with her parents at the age of six years. The family lived in various centers in the Niagara district and in Buffalo. For a time her father was stationmaster at Baden. At the time of her marriage to the late John Gough of Stratford some 55 years ago, she took up her residence in the city, and the family was raised here. Her husband predeceased her nine years ago. Mrs. Gough remained in the city for a time, and then went to Galt to reside with a daughter, Mrs. Charles McGregor, with whom she stayed for twelve years, before she came to her son in London. She was predeceased by one son, Jack of Vancouver.

Surviving are four sons: George, Oxford; W. W. London; Charles C. Fort William; James, of Dryden; two daughters, Mrs. Charles McGregor, Galt, and Mrs. F. R. Chown, Long Beach, Cal.

## Turkish Move Fails To Alarm

London, Oct. 1.—British official circles profess to see no indication of a deviation in Turkish policy in the news from Constantinople that four classes of recruits have been called to the colors. It is pointed out that the policy of the present government of Turkey is based on military defence of her frontiers, and it is believed the summoning of the recruits cannot be interpreted as pointing to a bellicose attitude. There is no idea in official circles here that the move is connected with the Anglo-Turkish dispute over the territory of Mosul, which is in the hands of the League of Nations.

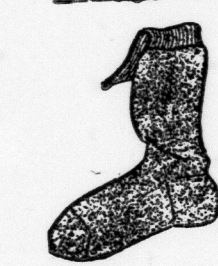

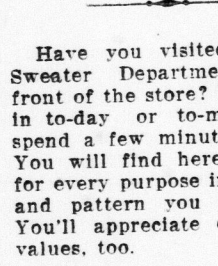
