FAMILIES DESIROUS OF OBTAINING Female Servants from England under the Government Grant, are requested to send in their applications addressed to the Immigration Board Office, Victoria, on or before the 1st May next.

It is proposed to pay to each person wages at the rate of \$10 to \$12 a month; \$50 of that portion of the Passage Money advanced by the applicant, to be repaid by instalments out of the wages of the female immigrant, who will be bound for two years.
