An important meeting of the shareholders of the O'Keefe and Morris Fruit Processing Co. was held at the office of Messrs. Mum, Holland & Co. yesterday afternoon. There were a large number of interested parties present, and the meeting, which lasted three hours, ended in a decision being arrived at to build a wharf and factory on Rock Bay, and to begin work immediately. The value of the wharf to be erected is \$30,000, and of the building \$40,000. An extensive plant of machinery will be ordered from east this week, and on the 30th inst. there will be a general meeting of the shareholders.

A General Receipt.
Mr. D. R. Ker, of the Brickman & Ker Milling Co., Victoria, was in the city yesterday in connection with the establishing in Westminster of a branch store of the company. To a reporter Mr. Ker said the intention is to do a wholesale business only in flour, oatmeal, feed, etc., and the retail trade would not be interfered with in any way. The Westminster branch will be the headquarters for the company's business on the Mainland, and all orders for up country and district points will be filled here. In connection with the warehouse being a general grain business will be done, and Mr. Ker states that his company will be in a position to purchase and pay cash for every bushel of wheat, oats, peas and barley offered with the B. C. Milling and Feed Co., whose mill will be finished and in running order before the grain crop is ripe, will ensure the farmers a constant market for their cereals, and as there is bound to be more or less competition between the two companies, the producer should be able to obtain the highest cash market value for his grain. —Daily Colonist.

Methodist College for B. C.
The annual conference of the Methodist Church, at its recent session at Nanaimo, having formally decided upon the establishment of a college in this province for the purpose of affording facilities for the youth of both sexes for acquiring a liberal education in the higher branches of learning, appointed a Board of Trustees, to which was assigned the duties of developing a scheme and inaugurating the work according to that body in its adoption of certain reports of a special committee appointed for that purpose. The location of the college will be one of the matters to which the Board will require to give its attention at an early date, and it will greatly facilitate the work of the Board if any person or persons at any of the eligible points in the province, having a suitable site for the same and desiring to have established in their locality, will interested and want inducements they or their community may be willing to offer for its erection. Work will be begun in rented apartments, in the month of September. This will not, however, fix the permanent

locality of the college. A special prospectus will be issued in due time, and it is hoped that a liberal patronage will be given to this enterprise by the people of this province. Communications may be addressed to J. F. Bette, Financial Agent, Vancouver, B. C.

The local branch of the Army turned out in full force to welcome him, and headed by brass band, marched him to town. At the meeting, which was held at the barracks, he explained how he had led while 13 years ago, and the fact that he had been in the army for 13 years. In 1889 he retired from practice, and has since devoted his spare time to preparing many valuable and interesting contributions to various periodicals. He has, at different times been connected with the principal French papers of Canada, and in 1868 took a very active part in organizing the Papal Zouaves who were sent to the assistance of His Holiness Pope Pius IX in 1868. In 1871 he was elected Speaker of the first Legislative Assembly of Manitoba, and has since then granted every office of importance in that province. On July 4, 1888, he was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of the Northwest Territories. He has been in Victoria several times previously, and is much interested in the wonderful strides in progress made by the city during the past two or three years. His present intention is to remain till Tuesday, when he will return home to Regina.

NOVEL CURE FOR DRUNKENNESS.

Half an hour afterwards the younger brother was found lying in the back yard of the Lang street electric light station, in a fearful condition, with the other bending over him, also in a bad state, four other boys round them doing their best to bring the youngsters to. Some gentlemen passing noticed the condition of the lad and lifted him round into the machine room of the station. MORAL DEPRAVITY.

A Shocking Story of How Young Girls are Led into a Life of Shame.

The Case is One Which Calls for a Searching Investigation by the Authorities.

Stories about gross immorality amongst children, are, unfortunately, in these modern days, too common. In the larger cities, especially, such as London, Chicago and New York, there have been, from time to time, exposures made which have shocked the whole world. When Victoria people will hold up their hands in horror at such occurrences in other places, thousands of miles away, what will they say when it is known that right at home, in the very heart of the city, there has been going on, for months past, what seems to be almost a regular system of prostituting children of tender age, and, what is more, by men whose position is such that they are looked up to with respect and admiration, and who are, in fact, the most prominent and successful of the city?

The circumstances of the case are as follows: Some few days ago, the attention of a member of the "Colonist" staff was drawn to a group of little girls, three in all, standing about the entrance to a well-known building, where there are furnished rooms to rent, and the attention was made at the time, "these children are guilty of the grossest kinds of immorality, and are made use of by men who live there." The information was most shocking, and in order to ascertain the truth, a reporter was detailed to investigate. The result of a careful enquiry and a deliberate personal examination is that, the whole of the scandalous proceedings, and as a matter of duty and only duty, the details will be laid at the earliest opportunity before the proper authorities, and an investigation will be demanded in order that those who have been concerned in the disgrace of the little ones may be dealt with as the law provides.

The girls themselves, when closely questioned about their actions, told with childish simplicity what they had been doing. They told the names of their neighbors, the occasions and all the circumstances connected therewith. Besides this, they gave information of what their own homes, told where their parents live in the city and all other information. The story was of necessity in Canada, the most objectionable profanity and immoral language. The girls have been well brought up, are daughters of well-to-do people, who are up to the mark in their education, and have been into which their children have been led. What seems worst of all, one of the dems named in this case has been luring the youngsters from their homes and hiring them to come with her in her house. The extent and scope of her influence can be imagined when it is stated that two of the three girls above mentioned, and the third, that some of these days they will go and live with this woman and will "drink wine and beer and go driving in a hack."

One of the girls is 13 years of age. She is the eldest of the lot, and the others being between 11 and 12. They say that they have all been "making money" since last summer. They all smoke cigarettes, and lead a life of dissipation, and use and abuse the toughest bawdy house in the city. There is no use disguising the facts. In the midst of the case, the police for both the punishment of the offenders and the prevention of further outrages of the kind, and if the city authorities are powerless to interfere, and special measures must be taken to deal with the wrong. The wrong is exposed as a public one as much as it is a private one, for the existence of such an evil in the city affects every resident. The sooner it is dealt with the better.

In addition to these there were Bishop Macdonnell, of Alexandria, who celebrates pontifical mass in Vancouver on Sunday; Archbishop Duhamel, of Ottawa, now in Portland; Bishop Lorrain, who will be to-day in New Westminster; and Bishop LaFleche, of Three Rivers, now in Seattle. Of those mentioned, the latter is the most remarkable churchman in Canada, being a man of splendid ability and one whose tact and great learning have become famous everywhere.

Vicar-General Marchel, immediately on arrival here, went to St. Joseph's hospital, and met the sisters. He will stop at that institution during his stay in Victoria, and will thoroughly post himself as to its present condition. The order of Morning Star, which he conducted in, was practically founded by him.

and that altogether, they are very well pleased with their trip.

Father La Combe, himself, is one of the best known priests in Canada, and the history of his life is full of thrilling romance. Though the simple minded old man of 60, his past meritorious actions, and with a good deal of difficulty that he has induced to tell something of his career, last night. Eventually, however, he said:

"I have been a missionary among the Indian people for forty-five years, and from the time I left my father and mother, who were poor peasants in Montreal, I have been in active labor. At the time of the rebellion I was among the Blackbirds and Green Indians, and the position was, of course, a most perilous one. The runner from other tribes had been among them, inducing them to join the rebellion. There were 5,000 Braves, well armed, and it was believed by the Government that every moment they would go over and swell the ranks of the half-breeds."

I was for days speaking to their most prominent warriors privately, doing everything in my power to hold them back, and at last I induced Crowfoot, the most powerful chief of the Blackbirds, to call a meeting to consider the matter. At the meeting, I exhorted them to be most careful and to take my advice, pointing out that they had done so much for the Government, and that I had never advised them badly in all that time. Crowfoot himself then declared for me, and said his warriors that he thought it would be better to act according to what I had said, and that they should not join the rebellion. I explained that, if they would write, and sign it, the Government would know all about their homes, and that night Crowfoot, without saying a word, took a pencil out of my hand and wrote a letter to the Government, and I sent the telegram immediately.

Sir John was speaking in the House at Ottawa when he received the message. He dropped his subject and read the telegram. In a time of anxiety and peril like this, it is not need to tell you how his purpose was resolved. The Indians with their word in place of money, and his never break it, nor did they. DR. MORRISON AGAIN.

Chinatown Honored by a Visit From the ex-Coroner of Victoria.

A Bulletin for the Benefit of un Vaccinated Celestials—The Doctor's Explanation.

Coroner, or rather ex-Coroner, Morrison, on Friday night, apparently forgot that Chinamen sometimes know a good deal about the English language, and occasionally read the English newspapers.

Posted up, yesterday, on the notice board, on Government street, at the corner of Chief Chung's store, at the corner of Government and Cornmarket streets, was a red paper containing a bulletin in Chinese. The translation is as follows: "Thus says the Government doctor: I am ordered to tell the Chinamen of Victoria to hasten to my official residence, at no excuse, on Monday, June 10th, and be vaccinated, each person at a value of \$1 each. Office at Yates street, 45."

"GOVERNMENT DOCTOR MORRISON." A COLONIST representative, with the aid of a penknife, obtained possession of this extraordinary document, and proceeded to ascertain the means by which it was placed there. Ah Muk, one of the most prominent residents of Chinatown, and a partner in the well-known firm of Chu Chung & Co., who own the bulletin board, gave the necessary information. He said:

"It was under my direction that that document was placed there. I ordered one of our clerks to write it. At about 7 o'clock last night Dr. Morrison came into the store and saw me sitting behind the counter. He told me that he wanted to speak to me for a minute and I came out to him. He said that he didn't like to see so much spreading in the streets, and that he was already five cases, and two among white people, and it was not right to let the disease spread. He was the government's man and—"

"Hold on a minute, Ah Muk. What were the words, as nearly as you can remember?"

"He said, 'I am the government doctor, you know. The other doctors charge \$2.50 but I am only making a charge of \$1, and I expect all Chinese to come to me on Monday and be vaccinated. I shall be vaccinated unless he wants to. Then Dr. Morrison told me that it would be all right and the Chinese would be sensible and go without force, if he could get a notice up. I then asked him if he wanted a notice up, and he said 'yes.' Then I asked him whether I should put in what he had told me, and he said certainly, and asked me to put up the placard. Then he gave me his business card and left."

"You're sure it was Dr. Morrison?"

"Why, of course I am," replied Ah Muk. "I've known him a long time."

"What did you think of the notice, yourself?"

"I didn't think anything of it. I know something about your law, and I never intended to obey it or pay any attention to it."

"Supposing Chinamen who don't know the laws see that notice, what idea would they have?"

"Well, I suppose that they would be liable to a government order."

"What would they go and get vaccinated?"

"No, I don't think so. They don't like it anyhow, and would not pay the dollar."

"If Morrison said that he had never been here at all, how could you prove his bad?"

"Do you think I got that written for fun? I know him well; besides, he left his card, and there were lots of us in the store that saw him."

Armed with this information two CORONER men visited the "official residence" of the ex-coroner. The gentleman had his sleeves rolled up, and, on answering the knock and seeing who his visitors were, curiously informed them that he was busy, that he didn't want them anyhow, and finished by saying that they could go away, which ever they pleased, and finally banging the door in their faces. Half an hour afterwards another attempt to obtain an audience was made. The following conversation ensued:

"Can we come in this time, Mr. Morrison?"

"What do you want with me? Let me alone, can't you. Why are you pestering me like this? I don't want to have anything to say to you. I'm busy."

"You'd better let us in. We want to talk to you on a subject that affects you, yourself."

"The doctor then opened the door, and the reporters entered the room."

"Well, what's your business?"

"We want to know a thing or two from you. We want to know what prompted you to go down to Chinatown, last night, and put up a notice to the effect that the Government had ordered you to vaccinate all Chinamen, next Monday, at your office, at \$1 per head."
