LIGHTNING ROD SALE

BILL STRONGLY OPPOSED

TORONTO, March 30.—Hon. Peter Smith's bill to govern the sale of lightning rods in Ontario by imposing a 50 license fee on all agents and a tax of 80 cents on each \$100 of sales was given first reading in the house to-day after the preliminary resolution had been passed. The proposal met with a good deal of opposition, Hon. Mr. Ferguson and farmer members on both sides of the house voicing protests. M. Govenlock, Liberal, of Center Huron, declared that the tax would drive out many of the smaller men and leave the business in the hands of a few.

STRIKE OF FIREMEN

AT WINDSOR AVERTED

WINDSOR, March 30.—The City Council to-night agreed to pay city firemen \$10 a month additional in order to avert a threatened walkout of the men.

A \$5 raise had been indignantly refused, the firemen declaring they would either get \$15 more or quit.

A compromise was effected, however, and the men will remain at work.

Sir Henry Pellatt Asks What Can Company Do

REPLIES TO SHAREHOLDER

Forced to Accept Low Price for "MacKenzie Interests"

TORONTO, March 30.—As expected, the annual meeting of the Toronto Railway Company was again to-day adjourned, this time until April 27. It was explained that the frequent adjournments were due to delay on the part of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission and the City of Toronto, purchasers of what are known as the "MacKenzie Interests," in getting the agreement fixed up. One shareholder, George Bird, of Hamilton, said he and other shareholders were impatient at the delay and they were dissatisfied with the price agreed upon for the acquisition of the MacKenzie interests by the hydro commission and Toronto.

A DOGS LIFE
"Of course, \$32,000,000 is a low price, but what can you do?" said Sir Henry Pellatt, speaking as a director. "With the Government on top of your neck and the city on top of your neck and every blooming newspaper on top of your neck—what else is there for it?" Mr. Bird was not satisfied. "We were told that the power earnings were very large," he said, "yet we are asked to sell for \$32,000,000. Some time ago an

outside valuator put the price at nearer \$50,000,000."
"True," replied Sir Henry, "but what can you do?"
"If the shareholders find it not wise to sell, that is satisfactory to us," interjected R. J. Fleming, general manager of the Toronto Railway Company. Sir William MacKenzie, president of the Toronto Railway Company, who was in the chair, remarked: "It's taking a long time getting the agreement fixed up." He added that the legal details had to be threshed out, and this was causing a good deal of delay.

NOT GUILTY; INSANE

Verdict of Jury in Case of 79-Year-Old Slayer

BROCKVILLE, Ont., March 30.—After short deliberation a verdict of "not guilty" on the ground of insanity was returned at 3:30 o'clock to-night by the jury which tried the case of Derrick Tennant, aged 79, charged with the murder of Robert Wood, husband of Tennant's niece, at Caledonia, on February 7, last. Just as Lennox directed that Tennant be held in the local jail until his disposal is decided upon. The defense admitted that Tennant shot Wood and pleaded insanity. Allen testified that Tennant was suffering from senile dementia, marked by hallucinations that he was being conspired against by Mr. and Mrs. Wood. While he was a patient at the general hospital, it was shown, he twice attempted suicide.

EQUAL PAY FOR EQUAL WORK

TORONTO, March 30.—The Federation of Women Teachers went on record here to-day, though not unanimously, as favoring equal pay with men teachers for equal work. "There is no sex in brains," declared Miss B. M. Pell, of Ottawa, in discussing the question.

SARNIA SETS NEW BUILDING RECORD

Permits for March Will Exceed \$145,000

BEATS ANY 1920 MONTH

Grand Trunk Shops at Port Huron Reopen on Monday

SARNIA, March 30.—With still another day to go, Sarnia's building record for the month of March is establishing a new record. Up until noon to-day \$2 permits had been issued of a total estimated value of \$145,604. The total thus far is over \$40,000 in excess of the highest total for any month of 1920, according to the records of building Inspector H. Walton.

Despite the wide margin by which the City of London exceeds Sarnia in population, the building record of the Forest City for the present month does not equal the local record by nearly \$26,000, the record in London up until Monday being only \$109,100.

For thunderstorms the month of March, 1921, breaks the record for the past 47 years. There were six days in this month when thunderstorms were recorded by Ralph West, in charge of the local office of the weather bureau.

G. T. R. SHOPS TO REOPEN

The announcement was made to-day that the Grand Trunk shops at Port Huron would reopen on Monday morning with the same force of men which was laid off on March 12. The employees will receive the money due to them to date on Thursday morning at 9 o'clock at the coach office. Several hundred men, who have been idle for the past three weeks, will again join the ranks of workers.

VETERANS SEEK TAX EXEMPTION

Walkerville Council Will Be Asked to Take Action

WITH LIMIT OF \$3,000

Question Has Not Come Before Windsor Aldermen

WINDSOR, March 30.—Seeking tax exemption on their real estate holdings up to the amount of \$3,000, members of the Walkerville council of the Great War Veterans' Association, at the next meeting of Walkerville Council, will ask that this be granted to all residents of the municipality who have served overseas. Soldier candidates, who favored tax exemption for returned men, were defeated at the last Windsor municipal elections, and, so far, Windsor aldermen have not been asked to deal with the question.

To explain the income tax obligations of wage earners, George R. Tambling, inspector of taxation for London district, to-morrow afternoon will address the local Chamber of Commerce.

City Solicitor Frank D. Davis has consented to represent Windsor on the Essex Utilities Commission. Two other commissioners will also be appointed by the Windsor City Council, one of whom may be a member of organized labor.

Secretary of Sandwich Board of Education for more than 31 years, David Tasker was presented with a purse of gold by members of the board at last night's meeting. Secretary Tasker took office when school facilities of the town consisted of one small frame building. To-day there are two modern fireproof schools, built at a cost of \$500,000.

AMHERSTBURG DRUGGIST, I. H. DENIKE, DROPS DEAD

AMHERSTBURG, March 30.—I. H. Denike, a prominent druggist and ex-councillor, of Amherstburg, dropped dead to-day while assisting in some work on the grounds of his new home on Laird avenue. Mr. Denike came to Amherstburg six years ago from Campbellford, to manage the drug business which he subsequently purchased. He was in his 41st year, and is survived by his widow and two children, Robert, aged 10, and Betty, five.
