Well, he wasn't. She took the seat as if it was hers, and no thanks to anybody. I waited a couple of minutes to see if she had the courtesy to acknowledge his kindness, and then in a raised voice I thanked the young man for her. If her eyes had been icebergs, I'd have been frozen stiff.

Another time I did the same thing and the women gave me sass for doing it. I know a number of men who have resolved never, no never, to give their seats up to women again because of discourtesy, the downright rudeness of women themselves. And who has the right to say they are not justified in doing so.

But all this is only a piece of the general impoliteness that prevails among Americans. We are becoming a nation of pigs in our rudeness, our greediness, our lack of culture, politeness is looked upon as a weakness, and he who defers to others gets left in the rush. Children from school look more like a lot of wild animals than a lot of well-bred cultured youngsters; vandalism has been added to the list of sport. A crowd from school or college are like a lot of raving Huns, business is legal robbery, deception is the rule of the day, and bad manners, disrespect, blackguardism and dishonesty cover us like a pall. We're not so much!

There is considerable dissatisfaction among the agriculturists of the Gore of Chatham township over the hog cholera quarantine, and nearly all unite in demanding that it be at once removed. It is said that only two cases occurred in this district and these over two months ago. The continuance of the quarantine means a very large monetary loss to agriculturists and it seems very unwise that it should be continued.

On Wednesday Thos. He was brought before Mr. Stewart, J. P., at Courtwright, and committed for trial. The prisoner was brought to the Sarnia jail on Wednesday night to await his trial.

### COUNTY COURT.

December Session Before His Honor Judge MacWatt.

There were no civil suits brought forward for trial at the county court, which opened at Sarnia on Tuesday of last week before his Honor, Judge MacWatt.

Two criminal cases were disposed of. The King vs. Goodhall—Attempted house breaking, with intent to commit an indictable offense.

The King vs. Rae—Common assault. The Goodhall case was taken from the jury, the prisoner withdrawing his election for trial by jury and electing trial by the judge. Prisoner also pleaded guilty and was allowed to go on suspended sentence. Mr. Towers defended the prisoner and Mr. Bucks, C. C. A., prosecuted.

The Rae case went to the jury. Rae was charged with assaulting his school teacher, Mr. Hicks, of Oil Springs, last June. It was claimed that Hicks meeting Rae on the street pushed him off the sidewalk, and that Rae then assaulted him. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty and the judge imposed a fine of \$1 and costs.

### AN OLD BIBLE.

Last Saturday the writer was favored with an examination of possibly the oldest edition of the Bible in Ontario. It is the property of Mr. Robert Parke, of Brantford, who during the summer has resided with his niece, Mrs. John Hunter, town-line, and returns to his home in Brantford this week. The Bible in question is in a fair state of preservation, size 8x10 inches, 3 inches thick, bound in calf. It is divided in three parts:—1st, the fly leaf bears the date of 1613; the 2nd, 1614, and the 3rd, 1615. The work comprises a preface, marginal references, calendar, the Apocrypha, and a sort of commentary, quaint ornamental woodcut designs adorn the beginning of each book and the reading matter is printed in old English and German texts which are difficult to read. A fly leaf contains a family record among which we noticed the record of births dated 1608 still legible but owing to the peculiar style of chirography cannot be deciphered. The book was purchased at a second hand store in London, England, nearly a century ago by Mr. Parke's father and contains the family record of that family. Mr. Joseph Osborne, 2nd line, Ontario, dated 23 years later than the one above mentioned which is a good deal similar in style and appearance. Both are literary curiosities. —Wymoung cor. ### ZULU GUN WENT OFF.

Sparta, Dec. 12.—George Berry a farmer who formerly lived on the Lake road, was accidentally killed while moving to a farm near St. Thomas. He was stuck with a sleigh load of goods, but the sleigh broke down and he had to transfer the load to a wagon. During the shifting of the load one of the two boys who were helping him discovered and old Zulu gun, a relic much prized by Mr. Berry. Berry told him not to touch it. The boy passed it over, but when Berry went to put it on the load it was discharged and the charge entered his head.


The Chatham News says the Gurd oil gusher in Raleigh township is flowing \$3,000 worth of oil per day, making it without doubt the greatest well in America.
