IN THE COUNTY COUNCIL, MUNICIPALITY OF ANNAPOLES, SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING, 1880.

Council met at the Court House, Bridgetown, on Tuesday, May 4th, A. D. 1880.

Present, the Warden, Councillors Ross, Leonard, Vidito, Young, Thorne, Roper, Miller, Corbett, Healy, Bent, Longley, Freeman and Buckler.

Minutes of the annual meeting of the Council were read and confirmed.

W. H. Ray, Esq., one of the Auditors appointed at the annual meeting tendered his resignation, which on motion was accepted, whereupon it was moved, seconded and passed unanimously that Col. W. E. Starritt be appointed auditor in Mr. Ray's stead.

It was ordered, that the consideration of the road from the Chute Road westward to the Phinney Road be deferred until to-morrow morning.

Moved by Councillor Young, seconded by Councillor Thorne that this Council authorize the amendment of this Municipality in the sum of three hundred dollars per annum to be applied to a steam ferry between Granville and Annapolis.

Moved in amendment by Councillor Longley, seconded by Councillor Buckler, that the party placing a steam ferry boat over the route be not subsidized but have the ferry free from any incumbrance in so far as the same relates to a duty to be paid the Municipality by way of license.

The party or parties placing a steam ferry on the route to be at the expense of repairing and improving the existing slips if necessary.

It is ordered, that Mr. David Ingle, be notified to file his Bond with the Clerk within five days after the adjournment of this Council, and if not complied with the Ferry between Annapolis and Granville be put up a tender.

On Motion, the Hon. W. B. Troop, was requested to furnish the Council with a statement of the Road Grant which Mr. Troop accordingly did.

It is ordered, that the Clerk be authorized to have the necessary number of Statute to Labor Blanks printed at rates tendered for in the Printing Contract.

On Motion, The Council resolved itself into a Committee of the whole to consider the Report of the Committee on the road from the Chute Road westward to the Phinney Road.

After recess it was ordered that the Report of the Committees Alfred Ray, Oliver Ruffie, and William Muir be not received.

Upon reading and considering the petition of D. B. Phinney, et al praying to have the road leading from the Chute Road westward to the Phinney Road, as altered and confirmed at the October Term of Session, 1879, closed, and the affidavit of notice, it is ordered, that the prayer of said petition be not granted, the papers being irregular.

Upon reading and considering the petition of D. J. Morse, et al for an alteration of a road in Bear River, the Precept thereon addressed to H. H. Chute, William Reed and J. H. Harris, and the returns of said Committee, and on Motion, it is ordered, that the said road be not confirmed.

Ordered, that a Committee of three Councillors be appointed one from the East, one from the Centre, and one from the West to draft a feasible scheme for the support of the Poor and the division of the County into two districts for that purpose, independent of Clements. Said Committee to report on the same to-morrow morning.

Ordered, that a Division be made in Road District No. 34, Annapolis, as prayed for and that Edward Dunn be surveyor of the same.

Ordered, that a Division be made in Road District No. 10, Springfield, the line of division to be a line separating lands of Christian Grimm and Charles Roper and further ordered that Robert Charlton be surveyor of said new district hereby established.

Ordered, that the Poor District of Clement be exempted from the operation of any general order or regulation of Council in reference to the support of the Poor and contribution to the purchase of any poor farm or farms.

Upon reading and considering the report of the Committee to divide the County into Poor Districts, the same was on motion adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO REVISE AND AMEND BYE LAWS.

ANNAPOLES, SS.

In the County Council, Municipality of Annapolis, Semi-Annual Meeting, 1880.

We the undersigned a Committee appointed to amend and revise the Bye Laws as directed beg leave to report as follows:

1st. In accordance with instructions received from the Hon. Attorney General we have amended the 4th section of the Bye Laws in relation to duties of Cattle Reavers, by making the same conform to Clauses 8, 8 C. B. S. Fourth Series. The 5th and 6th clause of the same Bye Laws we have entirely struck out.

2nd. The Bye Law in relation to the support of poor we would suggest be amended by adding thereto the first clause of the Committee's report on dividing the County into Poor Districts, and also Councillor McGregor's resolution in relation to poor.

3rd. The 7th clause of the Bye Law in relation to distribution of road moneys conflicts with the last clause of the amended Incorporation Act and will consequently be entirely repealed, save the establishment of polling places.

All of which is respectfully submitted, ALBERT VIDITO, GEO. ROACH, LEV KENNEDY.

Ordered, that a Committee be appointed to make distribution of the road moneys and bridge moneys, and report to this meeting of the Council.

Ordered, that Joseph Potter and Edward M. Potter do their statute labor in Road District No. 21, Clements, until they make immediate payment of arrearages into the Treasury.

Ordered, that the lighting of Bridgetown Bridge be a charge upon the Municipality, after the 31st October next, until the full amount of the same is paid.

A vote of thanks was then tendered to the Warden, who replied briefly.
