the first Minister to give immediate ministerial attention to problems brought to his attention, and I want to thank him for it.

Mr. Winch: And I really mean that, Sir. to address a question to the Minister of I should like to ask the Minister of Citizenship Northern Affairs and National Resources. It and Immigration if and when, in view of the announcement made in the Speech from the Throne, it is his intention to produce a white paper on the changes in the Immigration Act. If not, when does the Minister anticipate introducing the amendments, promised for so many years by previous Ministers and which we hope he will fulfil?

> Hon. J. R. Nicholson (Minister of Citizenship and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, first of all I should like to thank the hon. Member for his kind words about me. In answering his question I can say that we have already done a great deal of work on the white paper. We have now reached the stage where I find it difficult to keep up with the volume of material which is coming over my desk. I hope we will be able to finish the white paper so as to lay it before this House within a matter of approximately three months. After it has been distributed it will be referred to a committee for consideration.

> Mr. Winch: A supplementary question. Would it be sent to a special committee of this House, a joint committee or a standing committee?

> Mr. Nicholson: I cannot say at the moment. It may well be a special committee, but it will likely be a committee of this House, which will have full opportunity to study the material in the white paper and to invite representations from chambers of commerce, boards of trade, labour organizations, agricultural organizations, ethnic groups and others interested in this important matter.
