Question No. 452-Mr. Latulippe:

Will the decision made by the government to build post offices at Coaticook and Lac Mégantic be implemented and, if so, will the government agree to have the construction carried out during the winter to help relieve unemployment in that district?

Hon. Arthur Laing (Minister of Public Works): It is expected that tenders will be called next summer for a new post office building at Coaticook and the work will continue throughout the winter months.

Tenders for a smaller building at Lac Mégantic are also expected to be called during the summer and should be completed in the early part of the winter.

2. (b) As there are a number of items such as acquisition of right-of-way, highway signs, etc., which are not shareable under the Trans-Canada Highway Agreements, the costs to the provinces are not known.
