Mr. Bruce Howard (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports: 1 and 2. CANADA COUNCIL GRANTS TO JOHN C. LEGGETT

Question No. 29—Mr. Paproski:

1. Has the Canada Council awarded a grant or grants to John C. Leggett of Vancouver?
2. What is the total amount of Canada Council grants awarded to John C. Leggett to date?
3. For what purpose were Canada Council grants awarded to John C. Leggett?
4. Was the said John C. Leggett, at the time of the awards, an assistant sociology professor at Simon Fraser University?
5. Is John C. Leggett still teaching at Simon Fraser University and, if not, for what reason?
6. Was he ever suspended from his teaching functions and, if so, for what reason?
7. Is the said John C. Leggett a Canadian citizen and, if not (a) what was his country of origin (b) at what institutions did he teach prior to coming to Canada and for how long?

[Translation]

Hon. Gérard Pelletier (Secretary of State): I am informed by the Canada Council as follows: 1. Yes.

2. \$24,500 over three fiscal years.

3. To pay the direct costs of research assistants, interviewers, coding information and clerical assistance for survey research on class consciousness of blue collar workers in Vancouver area electoral ridings. (The Council's research grants do not include any remuneration of the researcher.)

4. Dr. Leggett was associate professor at Simon Fraser University when he was awarded an initial grant in 1968. However, his contract with the university had expired by October 1, 1970, when he was awarded a terminal Canada Council grant of \$5,000 to enable him to complete the project in which the Council had already invested \$19,500.
