J. M. Adam contemplates building a fine residence on the Sparling corner, James and Jones streets. Plans are being prepared.

Dr. L. L. and Mrs. Follick are holidaying at Grand Bend. It is reported that some Americans who speak of clay from this district for dentistry work have turned to town and will endeavor to form a company to manufacture a product for commercial purposes.

The town fathers are considering the advisability of oiling more of the town streets. Samuel Langford of London, formerly the well known farmer and sheep breeder of Biddulph Township, whose fine farm on the St. Mary's-London gravel road, near Revere schoolhouse, is now owned by Mr. Wells, late of Nisour, died from sunstroke.

### WILTON EXTENSION COSTS TOO MUCH

Controllers Refer the Scheme Back—Will Arbitrate Victoria Park Deal.

Extension of Wilton avenue east from Bolton avenue, to cost \$570,000, was referred back to the works committee by the board of control yesterday because the city's share of the cost, 8 1/2 per cent, was regarded as most excessive.

Purchase of Victoria Park for the parks and exhibitions committee, but the board of control balked at the price, \$250,000. It was decided to appropriate the water lots and beach, some 14 acres, and get a price by arbitration on the 18 acres of land.

### WESTERN CANADA. A Bumper Wheat Crop—Thousands of Men Required—This Year's Harvest Promises to Be the Largest in the History of Canada.

According to present indications the wheat crop of 1913 will be the greatest ever harvested in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Thus requiring the farm laborers of the east to assist in harvesting the world's greatest bread basket.

The governments of the respective provinces state that many thousand men will be required for this year's harvest. These will have to be principally recruited from Ontario and the west. The entire task of transporting the men to the west is already making arrangements for this year. Excursions from points in Ontario to Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta will be run and special trains operated, making the trip in about thirty-six hours and avoiding any change of cars or transfers. This will be a day shorter than any other route. Dates, rates and conditions will be announced in a few days.



**NINE HUNDRED MILES IN A HYDROPLANE**  
Havens Completes Remarkable Trip From Chicago to Detroit.  
DETROIT, July 18.—Beekwith Havens completed a flying boat trip from Chicago to Detroit shortly before 4 o'clock this afternoon. He followed the route planned from Chicago to Detroit aviation cruise and covered 900 miles. It is said to have been the most remarkable trip ever undertaken by flying boats.

J. E. Verplack, owner of the flying boat, accompanied Havens, who started from Chicago on July 8. Roy L. Francis and Glenn L. Martin decided on the 15th inst. at Pentwater, Mich., to give up the race, as the management had withdrawn the prize money owing to the fact that there were only three starters where twenty had been expected.
