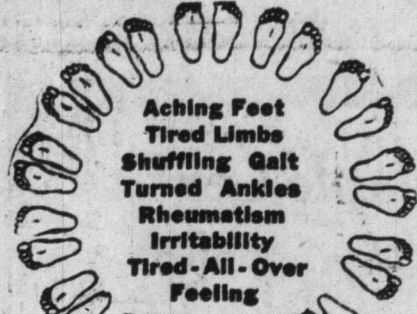

C. M. HAYS' BODY  
IS RECOVERED

Remains of Col. Astor, Isador  
Straus and Others Identified  
Also—Mourners Pour  
Into Halifax.

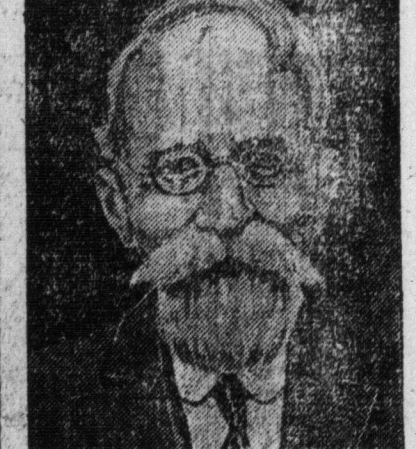
HALIFAX, N.S., April 26.—(Can.  
Press.)—Halifax is waiting in funeral  
garb for the arrival of the cable ship  
Mackay-Bennett with the cargo of dead  
bodies from the scene of the Titanic disaster.  
Hotels are crowded with the bereaved,  
and every train brings additional rela-  
tives of the victims. When the float-  
ing morgue will reach here was uncer-  
tain to-night.  
Altho 205 bodies had been picked up  
and 91 identified, according to latest  
reports, not more than 50 relatives and  
friends of those who perished are in  
town to-night. More are expected to-  
morrow. The cable ship's arrival is in-  
definite but she will probably reach  
port to-morrow.  
Among the bodies identified are those  
of C. M. Hays, Col. J. J. Astor, Isador  
Straus, George Gurnea, the Boston buy-  
er for the T. Eaton Co., H. J. Allison,  
Montreal.  
R. A. Fortune of Montreal will claim  
the body of Mark Fortune and Charles  
Fortune, and Senator McKean, a mem-  
ber of the Dominion senate, will take  
charge of the body of Hugo Ross, a  
prominent Winnipeg real estate man.  
No inquiries concerning the body of  
William T. Stead, the eminent English  
journalist, had been received here.  
If recovered it will be held  
pending instructions from England. J.  
W. Ragsdale, United States consul here,  
is prepared to take charge of the body  
of Major Archibald Butt.  
Will Prepare Bodies.  
Notwithstanding that many of the  
bodies have been embalmed at sea, it is  
believed that most of them upon arrival  
will be taken hurriedly to an undertak-  
ing establishment, where they will be  
prepared for inspection before relatives  
are allowed to begin the work of iden-  
tification.  
For the many that will probably re-  
main unidentified, the White Star offi-  
cials here have engaged plots in the  
Protestant, Catholic and Jewish cemeter-  
ies, respectively, and after keeping the  
unidentified victims here for a fortnight  
they will bury them here with ser-  
vices for all faiths.  
The body of W. H. Harrison, private  
secretary to J. Bruce Ismay, which has  
been recovered, will be sent to his home  
near Liverpool. Instructions to that  
effect were received by the White Star  
agents here to-day.  
It is likely that a special train to New  
York will be chartered to take the  
claimed dead there.  
A group of the bereaved held a meet-  
ing this afternoon and brought about  
the appointment of a committee, head-  
ed by the mayor, which will endeavor  
to assist those seeking bodies not only  
in the work of identification, but in  
their departure from the city.  
A wireless message from the Mac-  
kay-Bennett picked up here to-night,  
said she had left the scene of the disas-  
ter and was steaming toward Halifax.  
This should bring her here some time  
Sunday, but the White Star officials  
predict her arrival on Monday at the  
earliest.

TRIED TO CLIMB  
INTO TITANIC  
LIFEBOAT

Belgian Survivor Was Forced  
Away by a Sailor Who  
Pointed a Revolver at His  
Head, But Finally Was Pulled  
Into Boat and Protected by  
Women.



Herded with others by officers in the  
stern of the sinking Titanic until the  
water reached his knees, and then  
swimming off and keeping going for  
an hour until he heard singing on the  
water, is part of the experience of Jules  
Sap, a Belgian survivor, who reached  
Toronto last night. But probably the  
most thrilling part of his experience  
was when he discovered the singing  
came from a crowded lifeboat to which  
he swam and tried to climb into, only  
to have a sailor stick a revolver in his  
face.  
"I just thought I was going to die  
and so I tried to get into that boat  
anyway," was his view as he related  
his story to The World last night.  
Eventually one of the women pushed  
the sailor aside and pulled the all but  
dead boy into the boat. The other wo-  
men hid him in the bottom of the boat  
from the enraged sailors, who wanted  
to throw him out again.  
Along with two others who swam  
away from the plunging ship and were  
picked up after going thru soul-wrack-  
ing hardships, Jules is in the city under  
the care of Julius Somerville of De-  
troit, and Tom Henry of the Gayety  
Theatre. His companions and himself  
have their inspection cards which iden-  
tify them and give the numbers of their  
berths, which were in that part of the  
boat that was first flooded. When  
they finally got ashore, they were given  
a ticket to Detroit and \$6 apiece, as  
well as new clothes. From Detroit they  
came direct here.
