Argonauts' Defeat
'What a Game Lot!'London Expert Tells of Victories of
Sydney Eight and of
Fairbairn.

London Sporting Life.
Further interest was created by the
competition for the Diamond Sculls,
when Eric Fairbairn met the Canadian
sculler, E. B. Butler. One naturally
expected that the Canadian must have
shown good form to warrant his selec-
tion for Henley. He has done some good
performances in training, but lately
has been troubled by his wrists. He
had an off-day on Monday in order to
rest them. Apart from that, I do not
think he would have been good enough
to dismiss Fairbairn. The latter is
sculling very well, and showed a rare
determination in rowing the Canadian
down after he led for some distance.
Fairbairn came away with 18 and 32
strokes in the first minute, against 19
and 37 by Butler. The boats were level
for 12 strokes, and then Butler went
ahead, leading by barely a length at the
quarter mile. Fairbairn kept a good
length, and had gained half a length
when passing the half-mile signal. But-
ler attempted to come over to the Buck-
station, but Fairbairn drove him back
to his own quarters. Fairley was
passed in 4 min. 15 sec. and a fine race
ensued. Fairbairn began to go up, and
took a slight lead at the three-quarter
mile. Going up more quickly over the
next quarter-mile, Butler spurred, but
Fairbairn was more comfortable and won
by two lengths. Time, 3 min. 5 sec.
The first heat of the Grand was of a
truly imperial character. It brought
the two colonial crews into opposition,
and each received a hearty ovation as
they paddled their craft down to the
starting post. The training of both
crews had led one to form the opinion
that the Australians would be success-
ful, and expectations were fulfilled. But
what a game lot they were! They put in
a tremendous amount of work. Many
crews would have cracked under the pressure long before

reaching the mile post. When they led
the Australians, one anxiously follow-
ed the movements of the Sydney crew.
Would they go to pieces in their efforts
to pull the Canadians back? No. They
remained perfectly cool. The effective-
ness of their superior leg-drive soon
began to demonstrate itself, and once
they overhauled their rivals their
supremacy was never endangered.
Despite their fast rate of rowing,
the Canadians did not gain much at
the beginning. They rowed 13, 24 and 46
in the first minute to 20, 30 and 40
by the Australians. The New South
Wales crew were very smart on the
first stroke. Canadians led most of the
way up the island, and were one-quarter
length ahead at the first signal.
Their rivals went up when passing the
Recluse, and the boats were dead level
at the half-mile. The Sydney crew
continued to gain, and were slightly
in front at Fairley, 3 min. 23 sec. The
Canadians spurred after passing half-
way, but the three-quarter-mile signal
favored the Australians by one-quarter
length. They improved their advantage,
and, although the Argonaut stroke quick-
ened when nearing the enclosure, the
Australians were traveling the faster,
and won by one and one-quarter
lengths. Time 7 min. 4 sec.

Marathon Runner Dies.
STOCKHOLM, July 15.—In such ter-
rific heat as Sunday's here a marathon
race is a disgrace to civilization. Sev-
enty-five men drove themselves to a
state of insanity. Only 35 were able
to finish, and most of them were de-
mented. The temperature was nearly
100, and stories of many of the runners'
sufferings and what they did in their
delirium are too gruesome to be re-
lated. One person is dead and another
dying from the heat to-day. The dead
runner is F. Lazara, the Portuguese
entry. He was sunstruck in yester-
day's race and died to-day.
