

RUETHER BEAT RED SOX ALONE WONDER ON MOUND AND AT BAT

SIDELIGHTS FROM REDLAND

Cincinnati, Ohio, Oct. 4.—John Phil's Sox, the bandmaster, responded "to an overture of the crowd and directed the band in playing some of his favorite marches before the game was called.

Five former Cincinnati managers—Joe Tinker, Clark Griffith, Hank O'Day, Buck Ewing and Christy Mathewson—saw the Reds victory.

Ruether retired the Sox on four pitched balls in the seventh.

The heavy hitting of the National League combined with the fact that Ciccotte, the White Sox star twirler, was forced to retire, stood out as the features of the exciting contest. C. J.
