Squabbling over the School.

A deputation of School Trustees Mills, Fogg and Prest of S.S. 20, Norway, asked the Council to issue debentures of \$4000 for 20 years for erecting a new school building. Mr. W. Over, an opposing ratepayer, said that the last meeting of the ratepayers, at which the question of the school building had come up, was illegal through not being representative. The Trustees further had ignored the petition of some 20 ratepayers, calling for a meeting to erect the school upon another site. Trustee Fogg retorted that the resolution for a new building on the present site had been moved by Mr. Over himself. In answer to the query of Mr. Maclean why the petition of the ratepayers who had rights under the statute and now wished to reconsider the question had been ignored, Mr. Fogg said the Trustees didn't want to be dictated to. Mr. Over said he had made a mistake in voting for the resolution and now wished to recify it. MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.

Montreal, April 23.—Business still continues to be confined solely to the buying and selling of cattle to meet local requirements, there being as yet no inquiry for export. Trade, both in cattle and small meats, continues fairly active, receipts good and prices steady. This morning at the Eastern Abattoir Market about 500 head of cattle, 700 calves, 100 sheep and 50 spring lambs came in:

Last Monday's values ruled in most cases, and, as a good general demand was shown, the volume of business transacted was fairly large. The runge of prices to-day for common rough animals to best butchers' beeves was from 2c to 3%c per 1b., live weight. Spring lambs brought from \$2 to \$4 a head, and sheep sold at 4c per ib. The range for calves was a wide one, from \$1 to \$10 each being asked, according to size and quality. Following was the general range of quotations:
