Dur-ing the day every striker received a copy of the following letter from the companies: "You are hereby notified that unless you are on hand and resume duty as usual at 6.45 a.m. Saturday, the 28th inst. your services will be no longer re-quired, and this company will feel jus-tified in retaining any moneys due you and in taking such legal action as they may see fit against you for leaving the service without giving us notice, according to law." 


