

## MORE POWER FOR COUNCILS

Bill to Allow Them to Revise Estimates of Library Boards Before the House Yesterday.

### OBJECTIONS MADE TO THE PROPOSAL

By Minister of Education, Who Thinks This Would Discourage Establishment of Libraries.

Mr. Powell's (Ottawa) bill to authorize the establishment of coal yards by municipalities came up for its second reading in the legislature yesterday afternoon. The Attorney-General said the bill gave far-reaching powers, and it was a matter that should be seriously considered. If they gave municipalities power to establish coal yards, the House might be expected to receive all sorts of applications for permission to engage in various kinds of business.

The bill was given its second reading and sent to committee.

The Attorney-General explained that he desired to be understood as not concurring in the provision of Mr. Powell's bill to provide that the cost of sewers may be assessed against a particular area, instead of on the local improvement system. He was inclined to think, however, that the bill was a good one, and that it would make some radical changes in it, they should move slowly.

The bill was referred to the Municipal Committee.

**More Power for Councils.**  
Mr. Carleton's bill to amend the Public Parks Act was next taken up. It gives power to Councils to revise the estimates of Public Committees. The Attorney-General thought that it was a peculiar thing, when municipalities appointed a park commission, to usurp its functions, as the bill proposed. He would much sooner see a board abolished entirely rather than see it a tool of the Council. The bill was given its second reading, and the committee, as was also the bill to amend the Public Libraries Act in the same way.

The last mentioned bill, the Minister of Education thought, would have the effect of discouraging the formation of libraries.

**Questions Answered.**

In answer to a question by Mr. Carleton the Minister of Agriculture said that there were four factory inspectors, three males and one female, and the province was divided into three districts.

Mr. Lee asked: Is it the intention of the government to make such changes in the arrangement of the seats in the legislative chamber as to enable the members in all parts thereof to hear more distinctly the business before the legislature?

The Premier replied that it was not the government's intention to make any change yet, but he had no doubt but that the hearing could be improved.

**Crown Lands Report.**

The Commissioner of Crown Lands presented to the House his report for the past year. During that time there was sold 48,617 acres of land, valued at \$31,315, for agricultural purposes; 10,470 acres, valued at \$23,270, for mining lands; 28,540 acres, leased as mining lands, at a rental of \$74,091. The amount of university land was sold for \$12,206 and realized, while \$2500 was collected on sales of grammar school land. During the year 5787 acres of university land were sold for \$4212, and \$2874 was collected from this source.

The number of persons located in free grant townships during the year was 1307, and the acreage located was 148,312. In addition to this 138 persons purchased 628 acres under the Free Grant and Homestead Act. There were 408 patents issued, this being a large increase over the previous year. The influx was the largest in the history of the province.

**Teniskaming Settlers.**

In all 97 persons took up 180-acre locations in the Teniskaming district, and the population is now placed at 2500 souls, an increase of 130 per cent. in the past year. Eighteen townships have been opened for settlement in 10,470 acres, containing an area of 414,720 acres.

The applications for the military land have been reached 20,000. Attention is paid to the expansion of the mining industry. Twelve mining companies have been producing pig iron steadily during the year, the total product being 116,370 tons, valued at \$1,701,706, an advance of \$75,637. Besides the pig iron 14,471 tons of steel were made, worth \$847,280. The ore used for the manufacture of pig iron was taken from the Ontario deposits.

The total amount of the department's revenue for 1901 was \$1,874,224, of which \$147,325 was derived from land collections, \$1,479,847 from timber and forests, and \$147,052 from other sources. The total disbursements of the Crown Lands Department were \$252,977, including \$24,024 for fire, \$17,182 for surveys and \$18,314 for reforestation.

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**Exhibition Deputation.**

A deputation composed of Manager Hill, Dr. Orr, H. N. Crossley and A. F. Constantine, the deputation in the great hall of the Industrial Exhibition, and asked that the grant to the Industrial Exhibition be increased to \$500,000 per year, and also that \$500,000 per year be allocated to the exhibition.
