HE WAS INVITED "OUTSIDE"

But Mr. St. John Did Not Care to See the Man Who Threw the Challenge.

WORRY CONFLICT IN COMMITTEE
Some Interesting Side Lights Upon the Selling of Timber Limits.

"That's cowardly." "Who's a coward? You come outside and I'll show you who's a coward." The first remark came from Mr. St. John, the stalwart representative of West York in the legislature, and the man who uttered the bold challenge was Mr. Connee, the stalwart member for Port Arthur.

No one went outside, however, Mr. St. John being too busy with affairs before the Public Accounts Committee to engage in such a trifling exercise mopping the sweat with the bulky form of "Sunny Jim."

The committee had met as usual to have some more light thrown on the affairs of the Crown Lands Department. Donald Cameron of Killarney was the first witness called to tell what he knew about Capt. John Sullivan's \$3000 limit.

He had originally had the right to cut all sorts of timber on the limit, but for the last two years, this privilege had not been offered the limit at the time it was sold, and he was disappointed.

George Cole, a fire ranger, said he advised Sullivan not to be in a hurry to sell the limit, as Mr. Sparrow of Lansing, who owned the surrounding limit, would pay a thousand, but the ordinary cost of getting the timber out was \$3 a thousand, but, under some circumstances, it might cost as high as \$10, and last year was very unfavorable for this particular limit.

RAILWAY COMPANIES WILL CONSTRUCT SIDINGS INTO UNION STOCK YARDS.

FISHED THE MASSEY TROUT STREAM
Horse Backed Thru Plate Glass Window—East Toronto

Toronto Junction, June 10.—A. J. Anderson, town solicitor, and Andrew Dods, solicitor for the Union Stock Yards Company, have returned from Montreal, after interviewing Manager Hays of the Grand Trunk Railway in reference to running a siding into the stock yards from the line at Carlton station. It appears that last week, when Mayor Chisholm was in Ottawa, Manager Hays only arrived about three hours before the mayor was ready to depart, and was quite anxious to meet the mayor and discuss the situation.

After he had departed Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Hays endeavored to find the deputations from the Junction. One of the matters discussed with Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the question of running a siding into the Union Stock Yards. Manager Hays claims that the Grand Trunk Railway cannot be charged with the cost of common carriers and that it is incumbent upon the railway company to make a connection. This will be done, but there are a few details yet to be arranged between the Union Stock Yards Company and the Grand Trunk Railway in reference to the building of a siding, and the privileges to be extended to the railway company. This agreement has been submitted and likely to be accepted by them, so that it will only be a short time before the Grand Trunk and the Union Stock Yards will be connected in handling stock at these yards. The offices of the company are fast being completed and in a few weeks the yards will be in a position to accommodate the cattle trade of the province.

School Board Meet.
The Public Schools Board last night accepted Miss Bell's resignation and authorized a suitable testimonial of her worth as a teacher to be forwarded to her in Alberta. The recommendation of the Management Committee to increase the salary of Mr. Donald \$300 per annum was accepted. His salary is now \$400. YORK COUNTY COUNCIL.

Diseases Grant to Markham Fair and East Toronto High School.
After enjoying a pleasant excursion to Niagara Falls with Warden Boag, the members of the York County Council resumed their June session yesterday morning. The two matters of importance discussed during the day were, making a grant to the East York Fair and consenting to establish a High School at East Toronto.

Grant to Markham Fair.
The population of East York, York and Markham Agricultural Society consisted of James Eckhardt, president, T. Hood, treasurer, J. Slater, J. B. Gould and S. G. Little, directors. They urged a grant of \$500, to assist the society in their present position in which they find themselves at the present time. The conditions of the loan of the Fair Grounds were \$1 per year, so long as the Franklin House was a licensed hotel, or \$100 per year if the hotel was not licensed. The hotel has been abandoned, and the nominal fee dropped, so that this year the society finds itself in the position of raising an extra \$100 per year. It is decided to pay at a cost of \$2750, and they will spend in the erection of buildings and in the purchase of \$5000. Markham Township Council has granted \$1500 towards the cost, and the county is asked to grant the balance of \$2250. The speaker of the educator societies are, and it was recognized by the Council that the educator societies are doing much more in the way of education than they did formerly, and that the grant of \$2250 in stimulating local breeders to competition, and giving them an incentive to exhibit at the county fair.

East Toronto High School.
John Richardson, Mr. Ross and Mr. Gibbens were the deputation from East Toronto, requesting that a grant be given to establish a High School in that town. Reasons for establishing the High School were the fact that the township is a large one, and that the present school is inadequate to the needs of the township. It was estimated that the proposed High School would start with an attendance of 75 pupils. In reply to the question of financial support, J. Richardson stated that two rooms in the Public School were vacant, and could be made in them. Mr. Puseley thought that if the town grew, the difficulties experienced in the Toronto school would be repeated. The legislature was continuing to change the law, so that county could not withdraw support from towns because separated from the county.

Other Business.
The request from the Industrial Exhibition Association for a contribution of \$2000, was left over until this morning. The money is to be used for prizes, and not to be used in the general conduct and management of the Exhibition.
