

## ILLEGAL TAKING OF FISH AROUSES BARRIE PEOPLE

Local Paper Declares That Government is Negligent or in a Conspiracy.

Barrie Advance: The recent seizure of nets and other appliances for the illegal taking of fish from the bay brings home to the Ontario government the charge of most reprehensible negligence in the administration of the game laws in this district. In fact, the manner in which the game laws have been carried out, or rather not carried out, in connection with the illegal netting of fish in Lake Simcoe, assumes a more sirister aspect than can be accounted for by mere neglect, the poaching being carried on in a manner so open as to give good ground for the statement that the government had no desire, for reasons of its own, to interfere with the men who set their nets in broad devices and disposed of their catch. daylight and disposed of their catch on the streets of the town with an effrontery which argued that they had othing to fear from the fishery in-The officials of the Lake Simcoe dis

nal extent. These may appear to be strong terms to use in connection with the names of government officeholders, but The Advance feels fully justified in using language concerning the meaning of which there can be no posmistake.

We have repeatedly referred to the manner in which the provisions of the game laws were openly defied, and have used every possible means to good the local officials, as well as the department, into taking some action to preserve the fish, but the only satisfaction which could be obtained was an insinuation to the effect that the agitation was being created for political purposes by those interested in making purposes by those interested in making rouble for the Reform government. Private citizens, who noticed the de-crease in the tourist trade of Barrie, owing to the lack of good fishing, have communicated with the department and offered to give every assistance in running down the poachers, whose depredations had become a menace to the town's prosperity, but their efforts were of no avail. Discourteous and neglectful, as the government officials have shown themselves to be in their cavalier treatment of all who endeavored to bring them to a sense of their duty, yet the actual seizure of such an enormous quantity of illegal appliances cannot be as quietly passed over as the other methods which have been adopted to call attention to the practices which have been in vogue under the very noses of the inspectors. With nets, etc., in the hands of the police magistrate and the warrants out for the arrest of the suspects, the matfor the arrest of the suspects, the matter has gone too far to be hushed up in official circles, and public interest demands that the government 'nstitute a rigid investigation into the reason why these poachers had TO BE RUN DOWN BY PRIVATE CITIZENS, INSTEAD OF BY THE MEN APPOINTED TO CARRY INTO EFFECT THE REGULATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT.

Half a dozen poorly paid officials are of no use as inspectors. One good man who can give his whole time to patrolling the lake is what is needed.
