TO SMALLPOX SCOURGE AT NIAGARA FALLS, ONT. Mrs. Thornley Attends Social Functions While the Disease is in Incipient Stages.

Niagara Falls, Jan. 27.-(Special-)-Intense excitement prevails here over the possibility of a great spread of smallpox. Over a hundred of the most prominent families of Niagara Falls, Ont., have been exposed to the disease. The particulars are sensational in the extreme. Mrs. Julian Thornley, a bride of less than two months and a social favorite, is ill with the disease. On Monday evening last she attended a social function at the home of a prominent society leader here, where the amusement was progresive euchre. At amusement was progresive euchre. At that time a noticeable eruption had appeared on Mrs. Thornley's face, and general comment was made at the appearance of her complexion, but no one thought that she was stricken with the dread disease. The announcement was made this morning by Dr. W. H. Hodge of the American side of the river, who was called into consultation. Ladies who were associated with Mrs. Thornley at cards and particularly those whose wraps were left in the same room and in conjunction with hers are wild with terror that they will contract the disease.

Rush for Doctors

Rush for Doctors.

There was a general rush for doctors this morning, and telephone calls were continuous. Fully 80 families were exposed. But what adds additional seriousness to the situation is the fact that Mrs. Thornley attended a dancing reception at the City Hall about 10 days ago, where the elite and wealth of this Canadian town were represented. Prominent gentlemen from both sides of the river danced with the lady, and were exposed to the disease. Vaccination has been general, and the fumigation of clothes and wraps has been conducted in over 150 houses today. The matter has been reported to Health Officer Dr. J. H. McGarry, and he will probably order a quarantine on those who were exposed. He placed Mr. and Mrs. Thornley under the strictest quarantine, and has communicated with Dr. Bryce of Toronto, the Provincial Health Officer, who is expected here to-morrow to decide whether it will be necessary to quarantine every person who was exposed to the disease.
