

COUNCIL GIVES FIRST VOTE AND ORDERS PAVEMENT LAID

**Takes Advantage of the Powers
Under Revised Act to Improve
Street—Is Vote Legal?**

By a vote of 10 to 2, the council last night decided to put down an asphalt pavement on Park avenue, between Dundas and Queen's avenue. Only Ald. Forristal and Ald. Garratt voted nay.

This was the first vote recorded by the council under the powers given it by the latest revised assessment act, which gives councils the right by a two-thirds vote to put down a pavement on a street where a pavement is deemed necessary.

Last night the council was pretty sure of its ground, but today a little doubt is expressed as to whether the city can go ahead with the pavement until such times as it had amended its own bylaw to conform with the provisions of the municipal act.

The change in the law is due to ex-Ald. Stevely, who proposed the amendment, so as to take the people out of the hands of the paving agents, who play one citizen against the other, in order to have the class of pavement in which the agent is interested put down.

Certain streets in London have remained for years unpaved, simply because the agents were fighting to see who would get the job. Now, however, the city has the power to put down a pavement on any street it deems desirable to have paved, and may levy

the cost of such pavement on the property owners interested.

It remains to be seen how the people will take the new regulation. It certainly seems a little arbitrary, but without such powers the council has been unable in the past to improve some of the most important streets in the city.

The question now is, What will the council do with Dundas street, between Wellington and Adelaide, where for years the people have been unable to come to terms owing to the apportioning of the cost of a pavement between the property owners on both sides of the street from Wellington to Waterloo? On this block a boulevard runs on the south side, but on the north side the pavement would run clear over to the sidewalk. The people on the north side wish the cost of the pavement equally apportioned, but the south side will only agree to pay for the pavement which lies to the south of the center of the street.

Whether the new amendment gives the city the power to lay a pavement on the street, without the consent of the property owners, remains to be seen. If the city has the power, the work will undoubtedly be proceeded with just as soon as the sewer difficulty on the street has been overcome.

Whether the city is at loggerheads as to who shall foot the bill. It was put down on a 25-year de-

menture basis, and the people are still paying annual assessments for it. Consequently they claim the city should pay for the reconstruction, but the city refuses.

Until this matter has been settled, nothing can be done.

THE INSPECTOR FINDS CASES IN MIDDLESEX AND ELGIN.

Toronto, June 19. — Dr. Bell, inspector of the provincial board of health, has returned from a number of points in Haldimand, Elgin and Middlesex counties, where smallpox is prevalent. All of the cases are well defined, some of them are mild, but there are also a number which are professionally described as "moderately severe."

In one instance, it is believed, infection was due to a letter received from a home in Michigan, several members of which are suffering from the disease.

In Seneca Township, Haldimand County, there are over twenty cases. The school there has been closed. There are eight or ten cases in Dunwich Township, and in the city of St. Thomas, Elgin County, and the same number in the village of Wardsville, Middlesex County. In every case the local health authorities have taken all necessary precautions, and have in this connection accepted several suggestions made by Dr. Bell.

WHAT'S WEST'S FUTURE

Vice-President Whyte, of C. P. R. Says Empire May Lose It.

Montreal, June 19. — "If Mr. Hill, after completing his railway connections, can induce the wholesale dealers to cut their prices for Canada, then the entire western trade of the Dominion will be lost to Eastern Canada. If the country itself is not lost to the British Empire."

This rather startling statement was made here tonight by Wm. Whyte, second vice-president of the Canadian Pacific.

He states that 100 miles of the double track between Port Arthur and Winnipeg will be completed by the time the next crop is ready to be removed. He also says a good many American business men are settling down in Winnipeg, and a great 4th of July celebration is in contemplation.

He considers this step as most unfortunate. He knows men who have made money in Winnipeg, and some of these are the organizers of these 4th of July celebrations.

"Yes," he added, "a parade and regular 4th of July orations appear to be in order."

This he considers the most unfortunate part of the movement.

HIS FOURTH MURDER

Sheriff's Posse Should See That It is Jackum's Last.

Victoria, B. C., June 19. — Johnnie Jackum, the notorious Indian murderer, who was pardoned from the British Columbia penitentiary at New Westminster a couple of months ago, shot and killed Axel Smalle, a half-breed, over a game of cards today.

The shooting took place in a saloon, on a lonely road, near the Island. Jackum became incensed at Smalle's winnings and the game ended in a drunken brawl, in which several shots were fired. The Indian jumped on a pony and was far up the island before a posse could be organized. Sheriff George Allen, with four mounted men, started after the murderer, who is armed and will fight before he is captured.

Jackum has now four murders hanging over his head.

He had not been captured at midnight, but it is thought that his pursuers will surround him before day-break.

Yesterday afternoon he withdrew from his section in the sleeper, and in the evening he was found dead. In the coat was a phial containing a narcotic, and in Morrison's pocket was found \$3,000 in bills of large denominations. His grip contained valuable jewelry, and his belongings bespoke wealth and position.
