EVACUATE REVAL.

Petrograd, Oct. 19.—The newspapers publish an official announcement that the evacuation of the fortified port of Reval, on the Baltic at the entrance to the Gulf of Finland, has begun. The schools at Reval have been closed. The inhabitants of the city are being sent to the interior of Russia.

Announcement that the Government will move to Moscow was made today by M. Kishkin, minister of public welfare.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 19.—Russian officials here had no dispatches today on the removal of the Russian Provisional Government from Petrograd to Moscow, but said that the plan of moving the seat of Government, conceived some time ago, undoubtedly had been hastened by the German advance in the Riga territory. Ever since the removal of the capital was first discussed Russian officials here have reliterated that the Kerensky Government felt it could work with fewer hampering influences in Moscow than Petrograd, which is the centre of opposition. The German advance, Russian officials here say, undoubtedly has strengthened the extreme radicals in the Council of Soldiers' and Workmen's Delegates. WAS EXPECTED.

The impression seems to prevail in some quarters that the procedure adopted in connection with the enforcement of the military service act makes it compulsory for a member of Class 1 to be medically examined before claiming exemption. This idea is entirely erroneous. THE OLD PRISON FARM IS NOW DOING ITS BIT AS CONVALESCENT HOME

Guelph, Ont., Oct 19.—The old provincial prison farm at Guelph is no more. Everything that made the place look like a jail or a place of detention has been removed. Today fifty returned soldiers, the first of the invalided men to be treated here, arrived and took up quarters in the Guelph Convalescent Home. They will be quickly followed by more, until 350 are housed here. Everything is ready for the reception of the men, even to a theatre for concerts or movies, and bowling alleys. All the industrial and vocational training that was formerly carried on at the reformatory, will be continued for the use of the returned soldiers.

MORE ROOM NEEDED FOR SURPLUS GERMANS REQUIRED FOR ZIMMERMAN'S WAIL

Wants Allies To Permit Development in Central Africa.

NOT WORLD CONQUERORS

Former Foreign Secretary Is Trying To Pull Wool Over World's Eyes.

The Hague, Oct. 19.—Emil Zimmermann in the Vossische Zeitung has a long editorial on "German colonial politics in an English-American looking-glass," in which he treats of German Central Africa, as an important long editorial on "German colonial politics in an English-American looking-glass," in which he treats of German Central Africa as an important factor in peace negotiations.

"To facilitate the European situation," he writes, "Central Africa is one of the most vital importance.
"I recognize that our Central African plans would be most painful to the English and Americans. A German Central Africa that develops steady would be the natural ally of the Latin South and Central American states, and together with the Arabian and Turkish powers, would make for a strong influence in the Indian Ocean. Just this would create an enormous modification in Germany's war aims on the European continent, If England and America are honest with their allies, they must support this idea of Command Contract of Con allies, they must support this idea of German colonial expansion, even if they object to it."

Wants More Room.

Herr Zimmermann says that if Germany cannot acquire room for its surplus population abroad, it must seize it on the continent.

"In his new book on Central Afric, Zimmermann says he has shown how that region could be defended by a colonial army of fifty thousand, but his ideas have been strongly opposed by the English and by President Lowell of Harvard University. When the Americans and Englishmen get excited over a German colonial army, he says, they should remember that the Belgium Congo army counted 17,000 natives. He asks what is to be attained by "unjustifiable" attacks on German colonial politics.

"Every reasonable being, even abroad," he adds, "must admit that the present conflict can only be settled if the German people are given more room, if not in Europe, then abroad. The English and Americans say they wish to relieve the tension in Europe."
