However, not many real Liberals will shed tears over the predicament in which those candidates find themselves—those who have announced themselves as Borden supporters.

As the rank and file of the Liberal party are heard from the impression grows that, regardless of what prominent members of the late Parliament may do, the people are in no mood to accept the Borden Government at its own valuation. The assumption by the big interests of the "win-the-war" title, instead of fooling the Liberals, has had the effect, of increasing their antipathy, as the injustice of it arouses indignation to the fighting point. And it is not at all unlikely that thousands of Conservatives will see through the scheme and will carry out their intention to join with the Liberals in bringing to an end the era of graft that set in in 1911. After all, the people have not been heard from—their first chance to pass judgment on the Government's record will be on December 17.
