Hughes stated that he had been asked to explain the recent Guelph incident, the Jesuit College matter. "How can I do so when the facts are not yet disclosed?" he asked. "But, rest assured, that at the proper time and place I shall endeavor to see that the facts are made fully known. One fact I feel I can state in justice to Hon. Mr. Doherty, minister of justice, whose son it appears, is a student in that school. I have not seen the lad for a couple of years, but at that time and I am assured, now sane, the lad was a physical wreck, and I do not for a moment believe in any sense was even near the college."

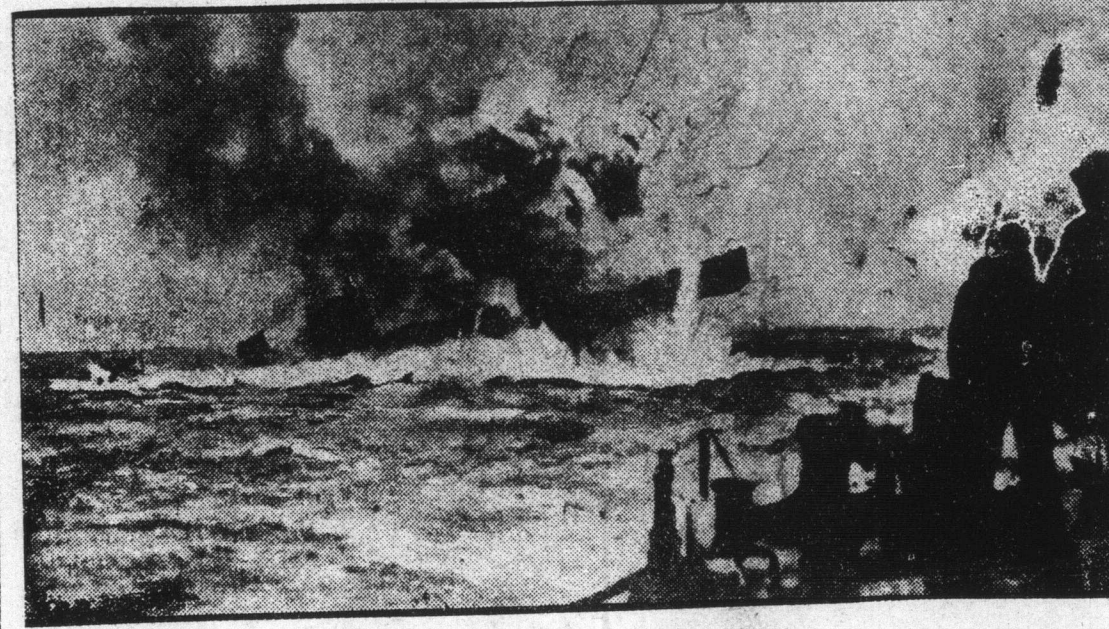

This fact is revealed in a comparison of the May receipts of taxes collected by the Internal Revenue Bureau, which were made public today, with the receipts for previous months. War taxes from all sources collected in May amounted to \$123,396,104.

CANADIAN WAR MUSEUM HAS REACHED CAPITAL MARCHING ON MOSCOW WITH UNARMED ARMY

Quebec, July 12.—The Canadian war museum has just arrived from England via Montreal, and is to be displayed for the first time on this continent in the Exposition Park here.

TURKEY PROMISES U. S. TO PROBE TABRIZ CASE

Washington, D. C., July 12.—Turkey has informed the United States through the Swedish foreign office that so far the true facts as to the reported seizure of an American hospital at Tabriz, Persia, by Turkish soldiers have not been ascertained, but that it will be done at the earliest possible moment.

GERMANY LOSES PAPER TRADE WITH S. AMERICA

Washington, D. C., July 12.—Germany has lost its trade in paper and paper products on the eastern coast of South America to the United States, with the possibility, according to a report today by the Bureau of foreign and domestic commerce that American mills will be able to retain the business after the war.

Crisis Reached In M. S. A. Situation When Officer Prepares To Resist Arrest For Alleged Contempt— Cavalry, Machine Guns and Infantry Used To Furnish Strong Guard.

Calgary, July 12.—Victoria Park Barracks, headquarters of Col. Moore, O. C. First Alberta Depot Battalion, has been turned into an armed camp. The Strathcona Horse has been brought in from Sarcee Camp to guard headquarters. Armed guards have been placed at every vantage point, and Col. Moore's office is patrolled with a strong guard. Partitions have been torn down and two machine guns placed that will sweep the open space in front of the building.

Will Resist Arrest.
This morning at 10 o'clock Col. Moore must, by order of the court, appear before the appellate authorities. By order of the military authorities he is not to appear, and any attempt to arrest him will be resisted with a military authority.

QUEBEC BARRACKS MAY FOLLOW LEAD OF THE CALGARY COMMAND

Quebec, July 12.—A secret meeting of all the principal officers of the Military District No. 5, was held at noon today at the Quebec drill hall, and although no official announcement was forthcoming, it is known the conflict between the civil and military officials over the habeas corpus proceedings were dealt with. As related yesterday Justice Dorian of the superior court ruled that Col. Rogers and Major Paquette be jailed here for contempt of court if, on July 17, they have not produced Edward Durand, draftee, who obtained a writ of habeas corpus from the superior court. That armed resistance would be offered by the local militia to officers of the civil law attempting to arrest Col. Rogers and Major Paquette is not known yet, but it is believed the local militia will do as much as the Calgary barracks to resist the arrest of the above-mentioned officers.

VALIDITY OF ORDER-IN-COUNCIL BEFORE SUPREME COURT JULY 18

Ottawa, July 12.—The important question of the validity of the order-in-council of April 20, cancelling exemptions granted under the military service act, reached the supreme court of Canada this morning in the form of an application for a writ of habeas corpus for Pte.
