Although no ceremonies had been arranged and the hour of arrival was uncertain, immense crowds assembled at St. Pancras station, which was thronged, large crowds being congregated outside. The only indication that something unusual was happening was the presence of massed bands which played "See, the Conquering Heroes Come" as the men left their train. General Fielding, commandant of the London district, welcomed the hattalion in behalf of the king and then the guards began a triumphal march across London to Chelsea Barracks.

LUDENDORFF WRITES BUOK IN AN ATTEMPT TO JUSTIFY HIS ACTS

Berlin, Tuesday, Feb. 25 .- General Ludendorff, who is credited with having been the guiding mind in the final German offensive in the west, has addressed to President Ebert through the German legation at Coperhagen, a communication announcing his return to Germany and requesting that a court of inquiry be convoked for the purpose of acquiring for him the vindication to which he declares he is critiled. He says: In the rest and quiet which has been denied me in my native land, I have written down for the German people a record of my life and activities. I desire to serve my country in the future as I have in the past. A large portion of the German people are opposed to me. My book will furnish justification for my acts.

The Spartacans are reported to have taken possession of Plauen and other industrial centres.
Independent Socialists in Leipzig have issued a manifesto demanding the retirement of the Welmar Government, declaring that it is "an impediment to socialism, and the liberation of the projectoriat;" The Independent Socialists are reported working feverishly for a proclamation of a Soviet Republic in Saxony.
