Lower Prices in Effect—On
Some Lines of Silver
Flatware.

Hardware and Metal sales:
Great activity has taken place
throughout the hardware markets this
week and many prices have been re-
vised as a result. Bolts and nuts have
been marked up about 10 per cent.
Conductor screws are also higher.
Wrapping paper has been again re-
vised and will now cost more. A new
and higher list has been issued for
shoe findings and the packing extra
on this line has also been advanced.
Corrugated box fasteners have been
marked up about 10 per cent. Skate
screws will also cost the dealer more.
Newer and higher extras have been
made on wire. Ammunition, snow
shovels and furnace scoops, ash sifters,
watches, washers, casters, sack pulleys,
door keys, lantern globes and pineapple
shells have all been revised upwards.
Some lines and makes of silver flat-
ware have been readjusted and lower
prices have become effective. Solder
prices have also been lowered. Con-
siderably lower quotations are current
for lined oil, also turpentine. Solder
prices state that they are still fac-
ing considerable shortage in their stock
of many basic lines, and owing to the
inability of the manufacturers to cope
with the present demand state that
they have little hope for an early re-
adjustment of the situation. The con-
gestion of freight in transit is also
proving a detriment to all concerned.
Prospects for a good crop throughout
the western provinces are said to be
very bright. Satisfaction is expressed
for the favorable way collections are
coming forward.

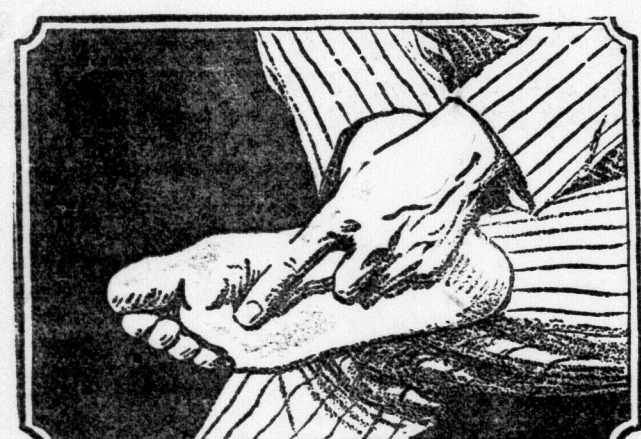

TEMPERANCE FORCE PLANS FOR FURTHER LIQUOR LEGISLATION

Local and County Workers To
Support Referendum Com-
mittee.

WANT ONTARIO BONE DRY
To Canvas For Funds in Oc-
tober—Will Advertise On
Screen.

With two factions, the Ontario
Branch of the Dominion Alliance and
the Referendum Committee, bidding
for their support to pass a referendum
prohibiting the importation of spiritu-
ous liquors into the province, the tem-
perance forces of the city and the
county of Middlesex pledged their
support to the committee by a unani-
mous vote at a meeting held in the
Y. M. C. A. on Monday. Dr. A. S.
Grant, vice-president and chairman of
the Referendum Committee, addressed
the meeting. Organizing committees
were appointed.

The following were appointed to or-
ganize a campaign committee in this
city: T. D. McCullough (convener), Dr.
R. C. Peever, Rev. D. C. Macgregor
and Mrs. A. Patterson. They will bring
in a report within two weeks, nominat-
ing members of the campaign commit-
tee, which has become disorganized.
Prof. J. H. Bowman and J. F. Park,
the officers of the county organization,
were appointed to get the work started
throughout the county.

Dr. Grant said that he did not think
that the weak spots would be found in
the rural districts as much as in the
cities. According to him five provinces
will vote on a referendum prohibiting
the importation of spirituous liquors
for beverage purposes from one prov-
ince to the other probably on October
25.

If the referendum can be carried
throughout the provinces putting a stop
to inter-provincial importation, then no
liquors can be manufactured for bever-
age purposes on the American con-
tinent for American consumption, the
speaker asserted. This would be true,
because there are laws in the United
States preventing the importation and
exportation of liquor.

**THIRD SUSPECT IN
PACKING HOUSE RAT
ARRESTED SUNDAY**

Three Ingersoll Men Faced
Magistrate On Burglary
Charge—Hearing
Adjourned.

INGERSOLL, June 21.—The local
police concluded a big "rat" hunt
at a late hour Sunday night, when they
took into custody the third suspect in
the theft of meats from the store-
house of the Ingersoll Packing Com-
pany Saturday night.

After running down two of the sus-
pects Sunday afternoon, the officers
were determined to keep the dragnet
open during the night, and at a late
hour the capture of the third man
was effected.

In police court this morning Sylvester
Desmond, Robert Kay and Ray Smith,
all of Ingersoll, were charged with
breaking and entering the premises of
the Ingersoll Packing Company. The
case was not proceeded with an ad-
journment until Saturday at 2 o'clock
being granted, and the men were
allowed out on bail.

Another charge laid against Desmond
and Smith was that of being drunk on
Thursday. They were fined \$10 and
costs. It is believed that most of the
stolen sides of bacon and hams have
been recovered.
