Several important changes in municipal legislation made by the Drury Government at the last session of the Legislature, are only now becoming known in city hall circles here as the vast amount of other outstanding measures at that time obscured them. These changes will become effective here with the election of next year's council. The board of police commissioners will be required to submit its sioners will be required to submit its estimates for approval of the council where formerly they had a free hand. The counch will have authority to erect war memorials, and to pay for them with debentures without obtaining the consent of the electors, and may also grant aid to patriotic organizations.

Dr. Charles D. Gray, president of the American-Canadian Deep Waterways Association, was in London today to discuss the deep waterways project with prominent men representing a number of the London business organizations. He also took up the matter of developing trade between this city and Fort Erie, Pa., which is his home.

With this object in view, he and members of the chamber of commerce visited Port Stanley in the morning and inspected the harbor facilities there. Dr. Gray was impressed with the agricultural development of the surrounding district, and was confident that a large trade in the products could be developed between Port Stanley and Fort Erie by means of fast boats,






