## MERCHANTS COMPLAIN SEWER ON DUNDAS ST.

Smaliness of Main Generally Considered Cause of Trouble.

Numerous complaints are frequent by storekeepers on Dundas street, west of Richmond street, about difficulty with Richmond street, about difficulty with their sanitary equipment, stoppages of the outflow sewers, causing almost constant annoyance and expense. The fact that the main sanitary sewer is too small is generally considered as the cause of the trouble, but in some cases lowering and enlargement of basements which has placed the connecting sewers on too has placed the connecting sewers on too straight a level to permit of clearance by the force of its fall is blamed for the trouble.

Answering a question on the matter, Assistant General Manager A. O. Hunt of the public utilities commission, expressed the opinion that the real cause of the trouble which is felt practically the whole length of Dundas street in greater or lesser degree is the smallness of the main sewer. The backing up of the sewerage gives trouble even at the utilities building especially during storms when a sudden rush of water is added to the regular amount of sewerage carried by the main.

The difflucity at the Utilities Building is to a large extent, however, overcome by a force pump installed in connection with the sanitary equipment of the building. The pump is operated by a half-horsepower motor, which works automatically. The sewage of the building is conveyed to a septic tank, from which it is pumped to the sewer, a foat in the tank controlling the motor by which the pump is operated. The maintenance cost, said Mr. Hunt, is very low, somewhere around \$20 or \$20 a year. The installation is, however, somewhat expensive, and this has had its effect in preventing a general adoption of the system. There are only a few similar outfits in the city.
