FINISH QUIZ AT ST. JOHN HALIFAX NEXT ON LIST

Engineer Morris Tells Commissioner Cassels of Excessive Charges.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Nov. 27.—(Special.)—Justice Cassels this morning concluded the marine investigation and left for Halifax to open court to-morrow.

Malcolm A. Morris, the engineer on the steamer Curlew, testified that in some cases he thought excessive prices were paid for supplies for the steamers. He said the department was an easy buyer. Witness said he had received presents of money from McDonald of the St. John Iron Works totaling up to fifty dollars, but these had nothing to do with government work.

Some cotton waste, bought at ten cents, was not as good as other which cost nine. Admiral Kingsmill, to whose attention this was drawn, said it was the buyer's fault. Witness had noticed differences in charges for regular and different concerns, but had never called Harding's attention to this, as the prices did not concern him, but he had spoken to him about excessive charges. The department was sometimes an easy buyer. Witness knew anything about a system of the department.

He also called Mr. Harding's attention to an account of T. McAvity Sons for cement at \$2.20 a barrel, when he was aware that a barrel could be procured at \$1.80 a barrel.

He had never received any presents from merchants doing business with the department. He knew nothing of any rake-offs on cheques of officials of the department.

Thomas R. Allan, machinist, was then called. He said he had been working on the steamer Lansdowne, and on occasion he had worked on C. B. Allan had paid him.

Mr. Gallagher, superintendent of gas buoys, was called. He said he did not order supplies on fix prices, and had no knowledge of excessive prices or of supplies being misappropriated.
