National Transcontinental Railway. Sir F. G. W. Hauitain. Chief Justice Sir Frederick William Gordon Hauitain of Saskatchewan was born at Woolwich. England, 58 years ago. After graduating from the Uni-versity of Toronto in 1880, he was called to the bar in Ontario in 1882 and to the bar of the Northwest Territories two years later. Before his elevation to the bench he was head of the legal firm of H. and Jona Cross of Regina. He was also premier of the Northwest Territories before they were converted into the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan. and he long held a prominent place in western politics. When the Province of Saskatchewan was created he became leader of the opposition in its legislature and continued the fight on the schools question. He was recently created chief justice of Saskatchewan.


