CLAIMS RETURNED MAN WAS TREATED JUSTLY

Street Commissioner Wilson Refutes Charges Made by Earlscourt Association.

According to Street Commissioner Wilson everything possible was done for Sergt Burley, who it was charged by the British Imperial Association of Earlscourt, had been badly treated by the department. Sergt. Burley, he stated, was in the employ of the city before enlisting at a salary of \$15 per week, and since he went away re-ceived his full pay, amounting to approximately \$1700. He crossed to Eng-land, injured one of his legs on the steamer and had it amputated steamer and had it amputated. After a long time in the hospital he re-

turned to Toronto and was given a position in the department as watch man at \$16.92 per week, almost \$2 more than he received before being disabled.

"It was the best job I had to offer him at the time," said the commis-sioher, "as it called for the least ex-ertion of any in the department and he accepted it." But Sergt, Burley was not satisfied with this and complained to the Great War Veterans Association, which investigated the case and reported to the commission-er that he had been fairly treated. He asked for an elevator job. but there was none open. The commissioner strongly resented the action today. of the Earlscourt association, and doclared that demagogs should not be allowed to exploit returned men their own selfish purposes.
