**BOARD OF TRADE
AIDS PRODUCTION**

Five Motor Tractors and Plowing Attachments Are Purchased

INVESTIGATE FARMS
Members Tell Deputation of Work of Resources Committee.

The Toronto Board of Trade has purchased five motor tractors and plowing attachments and organized the crews. Today a man will start out up Yonge street to find out what farms these machines can best be used for increased production. This statement was made yesterday by J. W. Woods, a deputation of central and western Ontario men and the cabinet on whom the delegation was waiting regarding the location of the new provincial highway from Toronto to Windsor.

After the deputation had got thru with the work for which they came to the parliament buildings, the premier asked them to hear two members of the provincial organization of resources committee, Norman Stenhouse and Mr. Woods. Mr. Woods insisted that what had been done in this way by Toronto could be done in proportion by all the other cities represented there that afternoon.

Potatoes last year had been brought to Ontario from British Columbia and Nova Scotia. While can be hauling potatoes they could not be hauling coal, said he. That was one reason for the tie-up of freight last winter that resulted in the coal shortage. It was one object of the resources committee to find out the need of each community in this regard and see if sufficient vegetables could not be produced locally. It was in this connection that he made his announcement regarding the purchase of five tractors by the local board of trade.

He emphasized the policy of the resources committee not to send out useless help to the farmers during the summer. The aim of the committee as he outlined it was to induce employers to make it possible for their employees who had been brought up to the farm or who were physically fit to do farm labor to get away for three instead of two weeks' vacation to work on farms. And also that employers should release all the fit employees possible for farm work, paying them the difference in remuneration. The committee had no intention of sending out workmen or those who merely wanted a country rest.

Mr. Stenhouse, also urging greater production, said that the present call for food was even more serious than that for munitions a year ago. "We are facing a world hunger," he said. "This is the most urgent of all problems facing us in the last hundred years. The call for greater production is the most insistent ever heard in Ontario."

**CLAIMS RETURNED MAN
WAS TREATED JUSTLY**
Street Commissioner Wilson Refutes Charges Made by Earls-court Association.

According to Street Commissioner Wilson everything possible was done for Sgt. Burley, who it was charged by the British Imperial Association of Earls-court, had been badly treated by the department. Sgt. Burley, he stated, was in the employ of the city before enlisting at a salary of \$15 per week and since he went away received his full pay, amounting to approximately \$1700. He crossed to England, injured one of his legs on the steamer and had it amputated. After a long time in the hospital he returned to Toronto and was given a position in the department as watchman at \$16.25 per week, almost \$2 more than he received before being disabled.

"It was the best job I had to offer him at the time," said the commissioner, "as it called for the least exertion of any in the department and he accepted it." Sgt. Burley was not satisfied with this and complained to the Great War Veterans' Association, which investigated the case and reported the commissioner that he had been fairly treated. He asked for an elevator job, but there was none open. The commissioner strongly resented the action of the Earls-court association, and declared that demagogues should not be allowed to exploit returned men for their own purposes. When it came to assisting the returned man he bowed to no man, and he regretted that the positions he had to offer were too menial and unworthy of the heroes of the war.

Sgt. Burley's job is still open for him in the department if he desires to accept it.

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL
Editor is Charged With Publishing Seditious Literature.

Isaac Bainbridge, editor of The Canadian Worker, the official organ of the Social-Democratic party of Canada, was committed for trial when he appeared in the police court yesterday on a charge of publishing seditious literature.

The alleged literature is the printed defence of Fenner Brockway, editor of The Labor Leader, the British Socialist paper, who was recently court-martialed in England for refusing to obey a military order. Copies of the defence were exhibited by the crown in court. Bail was allowed in one surety of \$1000. Magistrate Denison was of the opinion that Bainbridge should go to the reception hospital instead of jail.

BOYS FOR FARMS.

Dr. W. R. Riddell, superintendent of the trades and labor, hopes that 15,000 boys may go on Ontario farms as a result of his efforts towards greater production in this direction. Twenty-three thousand registration cards have or will be sent out. The response is excellent so far. Fourteen men are out addressing high schools. It is said the farmers' attitude of disdain towards city labor is changing.

FOR THE EMPIRE

The names of thirty-three Toronto soldiers appeared in the official casualty list given out from Ottawa yesterday. Of these two officers and four men have been killed in action, two soldiers have died of wounds, three men are now presumed to be dead, one officer and one man are missing, four officers and sixteen of other ranks are listed with the wounded.

Capt. W. Butson, whose relatives live near Bowmanville, has been killed in action. He was attached to a Toronto unit, and had been living near Bowmanville before enlisting.

Lieut. N. E. Walker, son of Charles Walker, of the Dominion Bank, has been listed as killed. He was 22 years old and received his education at Upper Canada College. Before enlisting he was with the Confederation Life Association.

Sapper T. G. Potter, 142 Robert street, has been killed in action. His wife, who lives at the above address, has been employed in munition making. He enlisted in Toronto last summer and finally went to France with the Engineers.

Pte. Percy Ball, brother of Leonard V. Ball, 42 Devon street, has been reported killed in action. He was an Englishman, 23 years old, and had been in Canada six years. He enlisted in Toronto.

Pte. Albert Ribchester, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Ribchester, has been killed in action. He was 21 years old and went overseas last May. He was a clothes cleaner by trade. His father was rejected when he applied for overseas service.

Pte. William L. Hill, brother of Mrs. W. O. Bragg, 5 Lake Front, Kew Beach, has been killed in action. He was born in Toronto 26 years ago. He was a decorator by occupation, and at the time of his enlistment he was foreman for Messrs. Heinz & Company. He is survived by three sisters and a brother.

Pte. William Donald, adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Kelly, 686 Crawford street, has died of wounds. He was 19 years old and was an English lad. He had been working on a farm near Barrie just before enlisting. He fought along side of Pte. Nelson Kelly, Pte. James Sydney H. Dunn, 265 Brock avenue, is reported as having died of wounds. He is also reported to be dangerously wounded with gunshot in the head. He is 16 years old and enlisted with a local battalion. He was shipper at O'Brien's tailoring establishment. Working there before enlisting. He was an only son, but has seven sisters.

Pte. H. A. Green, formerly of 38 Eglinton avenue, is now listed as presumed to be dead. The address of his next of kin is given as Toronto, but none of his relatives can be located.

Pte. Bullock, previously reported missing, is now listed as presumed to be dead. He enlisted with a Toronto battalion and his kin are supposed to be living here, but cannot be located.

Pte. Ernest Wood, 16 Sproult avenue, reported missing since the battle of Zillebeke, is now listed as presumed to be dead. He was only sixteen years old when he enlisted. He was born in London, England, and came to Canada with his parents nine years ago.

Lieut. Arthur Bealmer, McCormick, M.C., who went overseas with a Toronto battalion last spring, is reported missing. His home is in Weiland, but he was born at Port Huron, Mich., 21 years ago.

Bugler Ward Robertson Taylor, formerly of 2264 East Queen street, is reported as missing. He had just received his commission. He is 25 years old and had lived in Toronto practically all his life.

Lieut. John Morring, formerly living at 1097 Yonge street, has been killed in the line, according to a private message. He was an Englishman and had served with the imperial forces and was a South African in the Boer war. Lieut. Blake Farrell, son of Mr. Frances Farrell, 481 West Marlon

street, has sustained a fracture of his right arm. He went overseas with a draft of officers from Camp Borden. He was prominent in sporting circles.

Lieut. Dalton Styrpe, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Styrpe, 45 Cambridge avenue, has been wounded in the side and arm. He enlisted with a Toronto battalion at the age of 25.

Lieut. J. Robbins, whose wife lives at 905 Logan avenue, is reported wounded. He is a native of Wrexham, Wales, and before enlisting at Vancouver, he had been employed there as a hotel clerk.

Second Lieut. James M. Wardlaw, son of T. D. Wardlaw, 62 Beatty avenue, has been wounded by gunshot in the right forearm. He went overseas with a Toronto battalion. He has been awarded the military medal and has been recommended for promotion to sergeant.

Sgt. W. A. O'Leary, 5 Montclair avenue, is reported as wounded in the head. He enlisted with the Canadian Engineers and has had some narrow escapes with his life. Lieut. James Edwin Lindsay has written his wife here that he is in a hospital at Wimereux with a gunshot wound in the left arm. He went overseas last August.

Acting-Corp. F. M. Goodlife, 447 Jarvis street, has been reported wounded. He enlisted with a Toronto battalion and received training at Camp Borden.

Lance-Corp. James Ross, 47 Parkway avenue, is reported to be ill and wounded. He is a Canadian by birth and enlisted with a Toronto battalion.

Pte. James Rankin, whose aunt, Mrs. E. Jack, is living at 154 Dundas street, has been wounded in the left shoulder by gunshot. He is 21 years old and a native of Scotland, having been in Canada five years before enlisting. He is reported slightly wounded in the hand by gunshot. He is 20 years old and a native of Scotland. He had been in Canada 11 years and went overseas with a Toronto battalion.

Pte. R. McFarlane, a former Winona, is reported to be ill and wounded. He is reported as a Lieutenant with a Toronto battalion. He was wounded last fall.

Pte. Albert V. Mann, 205 Victor avenue, has been wounded in the shoulder by shrapnel. He was 40 years old when he enlisted in Toronto and was a brass worker by trade.

Pte. Albin Saunders, formerly living at 1089 Dundas street, has been wounded and is seriously ill. He is 30 years old and a native of Scotland. He was given as living at 110 St. Clarens avenue, but could not be located.

Pte. Louis Feathers, of Jamestown, New Jersey, is now listed as presumed to be dead. He enlisted with a Toronto battalion and was then 19 years old. He was born in England.

Pte. H. H. Aillet, formerly living at 135 Chester avenue, has been reported as wounded. He is an Englishman and had been in Canada for years. He enlisted to Toronto from Vancouver to enlist.

Pte. Fred L. Olsen, brother of J. Olsen, 81 Slater street, has been wounded in the leg by gunshot. He is an Englishman and has been in Canada for years. He enlisted with the T. Eaton Co. and is unmarried. He has been erroneously reported in the list as both killed and missing.

Pte. H. H. Morris, son of A. W. S. Morris, 210 Wallace avenue, is reported wounded. He came from New York to enlist with the T. Eaton Co. at the beginning of the war. He is 28 years old and was born in Toronto.

Pte. Herbert Tinsley Eekert, brother of Mrs. W. H. Eekert, 145 Dundas street, has been wounded with a gunshot wound in the left foot and right leg. He was born in Yorkshire, England, 34 years ago, and had been in Canada for three years.

Pte. James Clark Johnson, formerly of 1060 East Queen street, is reported ill and wounded. He was a South African in the Boer war and enlisted with a local battalion last April.

Russia was one of the great discoverers of the war, said Prof. Law, in proposing a vote of thanks. "We are just beginning to know that we do not know," said he. He spoke strongly against private exploitation of Canada's national resources. W. K. George seconded the motion.
