FIFTY MILES ADVANCE MADE INTO ROUMANIA?

Bulgarians Destroy Legend That They Will Not Fight Russians, is Claim.

BERLIN, Sept. 9.—(By wireless.)— Correspondents with the Bulgarians and German forces which are invad-ing Roumania report that along the Black Sea coast an advance of 80 kilometres (about 50 miles) beyond the frontier aiready has been made. They express the opinion that the progress of the invaders, who have occupied several important positions on the coast and elsewhere in Dob-rudja, explains the irresolution and comparative inactivity of the Roucomparative inactivity of the Rou-manian forces, which, having invaded Transylvania, are now merely sending out small detachments to reconnoitre Not only Roumanians but Russians have been defeated by the Bulgarians in Dobrudja, the correspondents say and this destroys the legend that Bul-garians will not fight Russians,
