C. GANDIL SHOULD HELP CHICAGO SOX

Once Canned, But Comes Back to Bolster Up Rowland's Outfit.

Chick Gandil, the broad-shouldered first-baser, is back with the White Sox, where he played in 1930. This was not exactly Chick's first chance in "fast company," for he went south with the St. Louis Browns the previous year, but took part in no games of the championship season.
When Gandil joined the White Sox he became one of the team's most productive new wonders. In 7 games he turned out the skinny average of .315, compared with his .244 in 1936 and started the season in 1937 as if he were going to turn up the league. His heavy hitting attracted the attention of Clark Griffith, who gave \$2,500 and three ball players for Chick.
Washington was selling badly when Gandil joined the team early in June, and then the club took an immediate breath. They won 17 games, 16 on the road, before a home run by J. Franklin Baker stopped their streak at Rife Park.
Gandil had as much to do with Washington's unexpected success as any other player on the team. As a matter of fact, Clark Griffith said that next to Walter Johnson, Gandil's bat did more to make the record than anything else.
Gandil batted .325 in Washington in 1937, and boosted his figures to .318 the next season. In 1934 he slumped to .280, but in 1935 he raised his eye and turned in a credit of .297.
Last winter Gandil was unexpectedly sold to Cleveland because, Griffith explained, he would not obey training rules. Gandil played a weak spot on the Cleveland team and helped keep the Indians in the pennant race for a long time. He batted .290, but as he drove in so many runs it was believed that he would be retained.
Now, Comiskey retains Gandil, who is 28 years old. If Chick will concentrate on baseball he should be the best first-baseman the Sox have had since the days of the lamented Donohue. In that case Chicago will have strong pennant pretensions, for Eddie Collins, Joe Jackson, Gandil, Weaver, J. Collins and Schultz form an uncommonly powerful batting string.
