come again, and empty barns and a sharp fall in prices will scarcely earn, besides a living, enough to bear the burdensome taxation necessarily following a reckless increase of expenditure that must be largely borne by toilers in field and factory.

Warning.

"A trumpet blast clear and loud should go up from this Farmers' Convention that can be heard beyond the vapors of selfish partisanship warning political aspirants to stay the lavish hand. Hold fast to the principles of the Farmers' Association, and KEEP A VOW REGISTERED. THE MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT WHO GIVES HIS PLEDGE THAT HE WILL VOTE FOR CERTAIN PRINCIPLES AND THEN DELIBERATELY BREAKS HIS WORD, WILL NEVER AGAIN RECEIVE YOUR VOTES AND INFLUENCE. This, I venture to think, is the only remaining method whereby 'artful doges' can be successful, set aside."

"At this juncture it is wisdom for our part to acquaint ourselves thoroughly with issues that are to be submitted to the arbitration of the ballot box a few months hence; so that, we may be able to draw a brush across the false colors with which party and faction invest them. Once upon a time a number of politicians had made more commercial progress in the last twenty-five years than in the previous century."

"Once let the farmers of Canada in a truly co-operative movement unite the remaining public ownership of the services, a principle for which the Farmers' Association has already most emphatically declared, and the annual expenditure of the people's money from three to five millions."

History repeats itself. Ten short years have come and gone, and the representatives of the farmers of Canada when I state that we, too, view with sincere alarm a proposed annual expenditure of nearly \$80 millions of dollars.

Tune for Pigs Speaking.

"We have still in our midst too many men who accept on trust the changing contentions of ambitious politicians, men who, with their chiefs, veer about by every turn of party expediency, with every blast of political wind. We need men who, like the mountain ranges, can change the course of the wind, men who will speak to this electorate in honest council and in simple truth. We have no lack of men accomplished in the art of speaking, but we have a lack of men who can do so with sincerity and who can do so to be re-elected or unfaithful."

Tribute was also paid to the energetic efforts of the secretary-treasurer of the association given without remuneration: to The Weekly Sun and The Bystander, and to the city press. The president advised development of the local organizations, interesting every member of the home, and bringing the wives and children to the meetings as well as the older men.

WHEAT ESTIMATES VARY

But Harvesting is Aways Behind This Time Last Year.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 7.—(Special.)—Harvesters have now all arrived, some 15,000 in number, and apparently quite sufficient to harvest the wheat crop. With Premier Roblin, according to report, bulging wheat on the Chicago market, it is idle to contend that the season's yield will be more than a fair average, if it attains that. Whatever may be said of the territories and the northern half of Manitoba it is clear that Southern Manitoba will be largely by fallow. A prominent local concern with agents throughout the country still puts the total yield at no more than 2,000,000 bushels.

On the other hand one of the great elevator concerns has just sent out a circular which is only an average basis, explaining this by saying that the company looked for a great drop in prices as the harvest advanced. This, however, is explained by the expectation that the western crop will turn out much better than the one of what they are at present. Yesterday only seven cars of wheat were inspected here, all of them being of the same quality. Winnipeg wheat receipts a year ago were, however, 100,000 bushels, and this year the receipts of new wheat started on the second of September, twenty cars being received, and on the seventh, a year ago to-day, 370 cars of new wheat passed inspection.

ARTICULATION WITH CLEFT PALATE

Subject of Discussion at Dentists' Convention—Relief is Possible.

The Canadian Dental Association held two interesting sessions yesterday. In the morning a treatise on the education of the dentist by M. C. Gidon of Paris, France, was given. A discussion which was generally participated in followed. The afternoon session was opened with a paper by Dr. Ottolengui of New York, on artificial appliances for cleft palate. S. T. Church, specialist in speech defects, read a paper on the cleft of the palate and the possibility of artificial speech. He held that the widely accepted theory that distinct articulation is impossible was incorrect.

Surgery, he believed, could proceed no farther than to enhance by skillful operation the possibilities of relief under artificial appliances.
