### SWALLOX IN YARMOUTH

At a meeting of the board of health last  
Thursday evening, Dr. Webster reported  
that seven houses were quarantined in  
the town, and that there was no more  
in the pest house for infected per-  
sons. It was decided to keep the churches  
closed, also the schools for three weeks  
from Feb. 27. All socials, at homes, and  
any gatherings of any body of people are  
now prohibited. Another meeting was  
held on Monday evening. Six new cases  
of a mild form of swallox have broken  
out since that one had been developed  
at South End in a building where there  
are 44 colored people living. This case  
was discovered by accident. The patient  
had been sick for some time. A  
building near Bunker Island has been  
provided for the accommodation of in-  
fected colored people. It is the opinion of the  
doctors that the difficulty was the care-  
lessness of the general public, especially  
the poorer classes, who do not take ne-  
cessary precautions as to vaccination and  
cleanliness. It was decided to have com-  
pulsory vaccination and the town will be  
divided into sections and physicians will  
go from house to house. A committee was  
appointed to provide hospital accommo-  
dation.—Yarmouth Light.

### MINISTER A VICTIM

**OF NEW YORK THUGS**

Rev. John A. O'Neill of Eng-  
land Bound to Hamilton  
Held Up and Robbed in  
Gotham Street

New York, March 12.—The Rev. John A.  
O'Neill, an English clergyman, on his way  
to Hamilton, Ont., to take a pastorate  
there, is satisfied the Wild West isn't  
dead. He was held up and robbed in  
Fondren police station house and told  
how two men, wearing black masks, had  
robbed him of \$800 in sovereigns on Thir-  
ty-ninth street, between Broadway and Sixth  
avenue.

According to one of his friends, the Rev.  
Mr. O'Neill arrived here last Saturday on  
the Lusitania, and went to the Grand  
Union Hotel, intending to spend a few  
days seeing New York before continuing  
his journey. Tuesday night he went for a  
walk, and following the stream of people,  
landed on the White Way.

The Rev. Mr. O'Neill is unsophisticated,  
and on his first trip through the city  
he has spent most of his life in  
the English towns, where he had no op-  
portunity to learn the devious ways which  
the New York police station house and told  
how two men, wearing black masks, had  
robbed him of \$800 in sovereigns on Thir-  
ty-ninth street, between Broadway and Sixth  
avenue.

"There he is," said the minister, "I have no friends in  
New York."

"I don't know him," said the large  
stranger, "but I'll show you where he is."

"It is very kind of you," replied the  
minister.

The two walked east along Thirty-ninth  
street, toward Sixth avenue. Midway in  
the block the minister's escort said:  
"Here he is," and a man wearing a  
black mask jumped in front of him, and  
poking a revolver into his ribs, said to the  
minister:

"If you make a sound or move I'll kill  
you."

The minister's escort slipped a black  
mask over his face and ordered the clergy-  
man to back up against the wall. Then the  
strange escort went through his pockets with  
astonishing speed.

In the clergyman's hip pocket he found  
a huge wallet, which contained the equiv-  
alent of \$800 in English sovereigns. How  
anybody could conveniently carry that  
much gold around with him the friend of  
the minister did not explain.

"Now we're going this way," said the  
amiable escort to the minister, pointing to-  
ward Sixth avenue, "and if you stir before  
we reach the corner we'll come back and  
blow your head off."

The minister stood motionless until the  
two men disappeared. Then he started for  
his hotel. On the way he met a police-  
man, to whom he told his story, but was  
advised to "run along."

who questioned the minister, refused to  
discuss the queer robbery.
