ENGLISH MAIL.—The news by the English Mail of the 30th June, by the Niagara, was received in this city at 1 o'clock on Friday morning, by Express from Halifax, and Telegraphed to Boston; but was not published in this City. The steamer Admiral, which arrived on Saturday evening, brought the news from Boston papers of Friday. The Mail was not received in this City till last evening. In future the Mail is to be brought from Halifax to this Province on steamers, so there will be no further detention at Halifax. The Niagara brought out 89 passengers.

We take the following summary of the news principally from the Boston Journal of Friday evening, received per steamer Fairy Queen, from Portland, for which we are indebted to our correspondent of the Boston Daily Advertiser.

The Niagara experienced a succession of heavy gusts from the west, which rendered the whole passage very disagreeable. Her freight list shows \$2800 in specie. The Niagara exchanged signals with a large steamer, supposed to be the Europa, off Holyhead at midnight, on the 30th June.

Liverpool, June 30.—The operations of the past week have been buoyant and firm, with an important extension of business transactions in almost every branch of trade. Advices from Calcutta to the 5th, and from Bombay to the 21st May, have been received, and are satisfactory in the extreme. The commercial reports state that at the close of the business season only small stocks of goods were left at Bombay and in the interior.

GRAT BRITAIN.—In Parliament, the Bill for the removal of the Jewish disabilities had been rejected in the upper house by a majority of 25. Ministers not venturing to venture on the subject, the rejection of this Bill leads to an immediate election for the city of London, and Baron Rothschild has already accepted the Chiltern Hundreds, and made an appeal to the electors. His election is considered certain.

The House of Commons has affirmed the second reading of the marriage bill, to render valid marriages with the sisters of deceased wives. The affirmative bill which recently completed its passage through the Commons has been rejected in the Lords by a large majority.

The Smith O'Brien transportation bill is now an act of Parliament, but it is supposed the approaching visit of Her Majesty to Ireland will be signalled by extending her royal pardon to the Irish state prisoners.

THE STATE PRISONERS.—Another paper states, that Smith O'Brien, and the other three state prisoners will be sent to Van Diemen's Land in Her Majesty's ship Swift, ordered to the Pacific station.

ROYAL VISIT TO IRELAND.—It is well known that Her Majesty's intention of visiting Ireland during the forthcoming season is of long standing, and that in several previous years the Queen had hoped to honour her Irish subjects with her presence in Ireland, and to visit the various parts of the state, as any large expenditure on mere ceremony would be ill-timed and inconvenient to her subjects. She proposes therefore to embark in the Royal yacht, to touch first at the Irish Channel, and to proceed thence along the Irish coast to Dublin, where she will remain for a few days the guests of His Excellency Lord Clarendon. Upon leaving Dublin the Royal yacht will proceed northwards along the Irish coast to Belfast, and thence cross to Scotland. Although the precise period of Her Majesty's visit cannot yet be fixed, it will probably take place as early as August as the termination of the season of Parliament will permit.

GLEN TILT.—By a decision of the Court of Session in Edinburgh, the Glen Tilt case has been given against the Duke of Athol, and that beautiful rig of way must be kept open for tourists and all others who may be concerned.

FRANCE.—Advices from Paris to Tuesday evening, state that the city was perfectly tranquil.—Business on the Bourse was steady and stocks had an upward tendency.

In the course of the debate in the Assembly on foreign affairs, ministers declared that there was no danger of war. M. de Tocqueville said that after having more carefully considered the subject, he had been unable to discover the slightest trace of that new ally alliance of which honorable members had expressed such jealousy. In the course of his speech, M. de Tocqueville talked of the frankness of the Russian government—an expression that was received with shouts of derisive laughter.

During the debate, Gen. Cavagnac made a most important speech, which may be considered as the resume of the principle of that important section of the republican party, which, while it desires peace is prepared for war, and which, while it supports order insists on progress.

Gen. Cavagnac said:—I fully agree with the honorable gentleman who has said that a great country like France should not remain in a state of insolation. It was necessary that we should get out of that position. It was essential that we should form an alliance with some government, but the question was, what government should we select? To whom should we address ourselves? To Prussia? To Austria? Those two powers were engaged in struggles. We then made overtures to a great power—England, and in doing so we acted in conformity with the wishes of the constituent Assembly. It has been said that the English government only accepted our alliance in order to be able the better to watch us. Certainly England would not become our ally had it not been her interest so to do; but that interest is reciprocal, and England has an interest in watching France. What reciprocal surveillance is the basis of all alliances between governments. In reply to our application, England accepted our offer of alliance as she did, not from a wish to preserve peace, but because she had no other alternative.

I think that the explanation I have given will be a sufficient reply to the reproach made against us of giving rise to a new coalition. (Hear, hear.)

SERIOUS RIOT AND LOSS OF LIFE.—On Thursday last, our City was the theatre of one of the most disgraceful scenes that has ever occurred in this or any other country, and which has resulted in the death of several persons and the wounding of a number of others, some of whom are now recovering.

The number of persons arrested at Lyons in consequence of the attempted insurrection amounted to more than two hundred. ITALY.—After a severe bombardment, three squadrons of the French army succeeded in entering the city of Rome, and the French flag was hoisted on the morning of the 22d. They have since been occupied with operations for acquiring possession of the inner bastion and defence, but up to the 22d they had not made much progress. Every inch of the ground was stoutly defended by Garibaldi, who still continues to animate his troops to resistance.

The latest intelligence received by the government from the expeditionary camp at Rome states that Gen. Oudinot had so far succeeded in his operations upon the outskirts that the city was entirely in his power, to spare which and the horrors of a frightful carnage, he has submitted terms for the evacuation of the city through M. Corelli, which it is thought would be accepted by the Romans.

It is said that the English government has presented a friendly remonstrance against the capture of Rome, and has urged on the French government the necessity of coming to an accommodation with the Romans.

DENMARK AND THE DUCHIES.—The London Globe of Friday, on information in its place full credit, states that the Schleswig affair has rapidly taken a new turn, and that the final settlement may be carried in a fortnight. Hostilities, however, are still expected on between the belligerents, but without any important result.

AUSTRIA AND HUNGARY.—The Hungarians were partially defeated by the Austrian troops on the 21st, and were forced to retire beyond the Waag, where, from the nature of the country, they will be better able to repel the advance of the invading forces.

It appears from letters in the Austrian and German journals, that engagements have recently taken place between the Austrians and Hungarians at Kaposvar and on points of the Waag; but that neither side has gained any advantage, and the Hungarians give to the Hungarians. The German Reform, which hitherto has been favorable to the Austrians, says that they have sustained severe checks.

It is said that cholera, typhus, and other maladies are raging in the camp, and that the Magyars display greater enthusiasm than ever.

EAST INDIES.—From China we learn that the Emperor had refused to carry out the stipulations of the two treaties, which provided that Canton should be open to foreigners. In the communication to the Emperor, the Governor of Canton, Mr. Bonham, says the Emperor had determined that as the people of Canton have refused to receive foreigners into the town, how can he force an opposite course to the people.

From the nature of the proclamation it is quite plain that the authorities were prepared to resist the entrance of the foreigners into the city, but a great sacrifice of human blood had been averted by Lord Palmerston having given special directions that nothing more should be done than report the repudiation of the treaty to him.

Accounts from Java announce a complete victory by the Dutch. The attack commenced on the 13th April, and after thirteen hours' fighting, all the Dutch troops were taken, and the Netherlands was hoisted within the walls. The British, it is said, had 5000 killed, and the loss of the Dutch was about 250. It is assumed that the island will forthwith be annexed to the Dutch possessions.
