

Workmen Seized and Transported to Germany, Says Polish Mem ber of Reichstag


Paris, Dec. 11.—Evidence that the inhabitants of Russian Poland have been subjected to a policy of forced labor and deportation similar to that invoked against the Belgians is contained in a speech recently reflivered in the Reichstag by a Polish deputy, Tronpezynski, which, with the debate to which it gave rise, was suppressed by the German censorship. It was published, however, in the Polish newspaper, Dzienik Poznanski, from which the following extracts are taken:
