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FOUR FROM THE CAPITAL WOUNDED

John Markey Latest Frederickton Man in the List

Two Brothers Are Hit Lockhart Boys of Truro—German Declare Canadians "Devilish Good Fighters"—Sussex and Charlotte County Heroes of the War

Private John Markey, wounded in the 14th Battalion, is the fourth Frederickton man to be wounded. The others are Privates Archie Smith, Joseph Leford and Arnold Smith. Private Markey left Truro on August with the first draft from the 14th Battalion. He was one of the first men to reach the firing line, having been in the first draft from the 14th Battalion sent to France to reinforce the 14th Battalion for almost four months, and in letters to his wife in this city told of meeting several Frederickton men in the trenches.

He was a member of the "Maryville Lancers" and was a sergeant in Major Guthrie's company. He was wounded in the 14th Battalion, and in letters to his wife in this city told of meeting several Frederickton men in the trenches.
