Resuming Service To West Indies

THE steamship service for the West Indies trade by the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company from Saint John will be resumed on Wednesday of this week with the sailing of the steamer Chignecto, according to an announcement by William Thomson & Co., Ltd., local agents, on Saturday. This service was interrupted owing to difficulty with a government subsidy but commencing this week the steamers will go back on their former itinerary, including Bermuda, Barbados, Trinidad, Demerara, St. Vincent, Antigua, Montserrat, Dominica, St. Lucia, Grenada and St. Vincent.

Morning Stock Letter
NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—The market was a great deal stronger on Saturday than on the preceding days, but a good part of its strength came from week-end covering. However, there were moves in specialties such as Asphalts, Westinghouse Airbrake and GRS. That showed the bull side of the market still appeared all right to certain groups. The action of these stocks should restore the confidence of other stocks and we look for a much stronger market this week than the one last week. Quite likely there will be at other bear drive at stock today or tomorrow, but we doubt if it accomplishes much, and we believe the recent leaders that have been under pressure lately, such as DuPont, Allied Chemical, etc., will rally again this week and there will be fresh upward moves in specialties. Quite a few traders who were buying & Steel above 135, are going short of it now, and while Steel will go higher before it sells five points lower, Bethlehem steel and Tule will during the reaction and is a purchase. Foundation sheet and tinplate, Int. Paper and some of the rail stocks, such as Gt. N. Y. and Central should sell higher again.
