Rev. J. Dunlop Gives Address at West Side Banquet

All Must Work; No Arm-chairs in Church or State

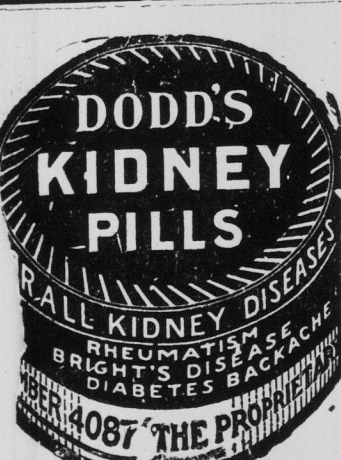

### Grain Crop Delay Cuts Dollar To Par

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—After enjoying for some months, a premium ranging from 1-1/2 to 3-1/2 of one per cent, Canadian dollars were back to par value in New York today, for the first time since May 20, last. The decline is attributed in financial circles to the delay in Canadian grain coming forward, and also to the amortization of Canadian government bonds here recently, when \$35,000,000 in Canadian funds had to be provided.

### GETS \$300,000 ON RAILWAY PATENT

Vancouver Man's Invention is Aimed at Prevention of Accidents

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 8.—Joseph W. Saunders, 40, Vancouver inventor, announced yesterday that he had received \$300,000 as an initial payment for the Canadian rights for a device through which he believed it would be possible to eliminate 99 per cent. of all railway accidents, from a syndicate which proposed to erect a plant here at a cost of \$1,000,000, for manufacture of the invention. Saunders explained the device as consisting of a low voltage electrical wire running along railway tracks, which, when affected by open switches, broken rails, washboards, slides or burned bridges will automatically bring approaching trains to a halt in time to avert accidents.

One Body Washed Ashore After Coastguard Battle; Had Liquor Cargo

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 8.—A Canadian power boat which fought a running battle with a coastguard ram chaser 2208 off Port Abino recently is believed to have gone down with the loss of two lives, and a large cargo of contraband. The body of Aaron Vandevore of Port Colborne, Ont., has been washed ashore at Port Dover, Ont., floating on a life preserver from the craft that successfully gave battle to the coastguardmen, whose boat was beached and weapons stolen. The pair are said to have left Port Colborne with a large cargo of liquor Wednesday night.

VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., Oct. 8.—The British schooner Nova Queen, which was run down early Wednesday morning off Nantuxet Shoals by an unidentified steamer, was towed to last night by the coast guard cutter Ossipee. 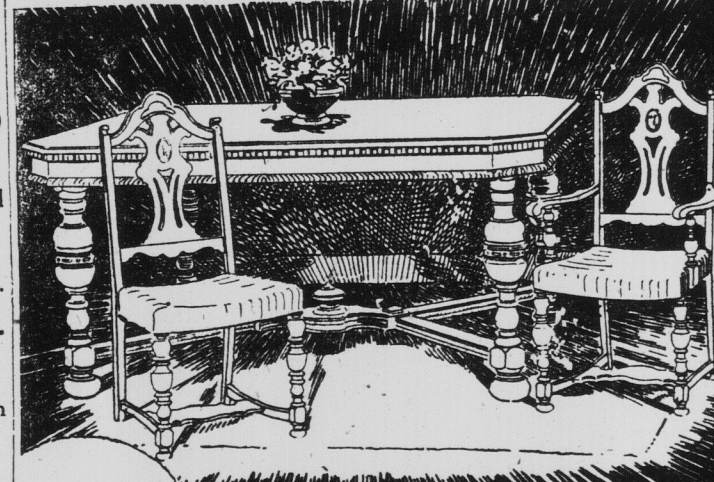

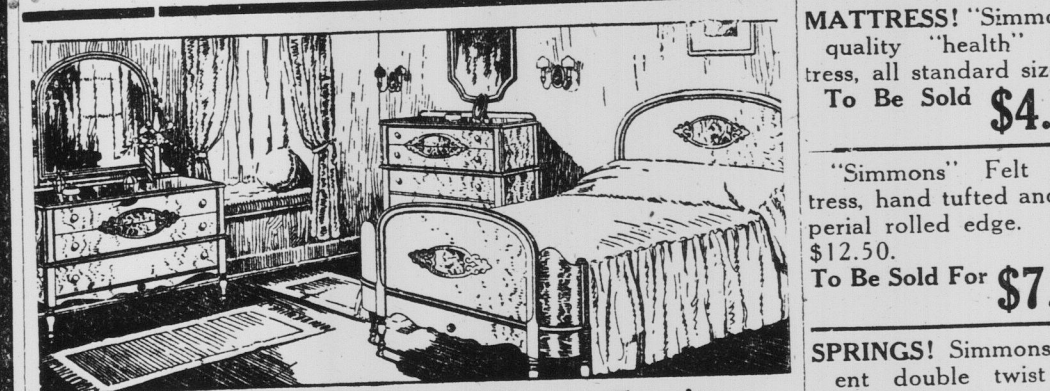
