

Saunders. 40, Vancouver inventor, announced yesterday that he had received \$300,000 as an initial payment for the Canadian rights for a device through which he believed it would be possible to eliminate 99 per cent. of all railway accidents, from a syndicate which proposed to erect a plant here at a cost of \$1,500,000, for manufacture of the invention.
