**Railway From Kapuskasing to Smoke Falls Will Be Constructed**

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 27.—The Spruce Falls Paper and Pulp Company, holders of large limits from the Ontario government, have let contracts, it was learned here last night, for the construction of a railway from Kapuskasing to Smoke Falls at a cost of about \$15,000,000. Under the terms of the contract, the railway, which is one of the largest industrial projects to be undertaken in Northern Ontario in some time, must be in operation by the end of 1928.
