ALCOHOL SEIZED THOUGHT WORTH ABOUT \$40,000

190 Ten-Gallon Tins in Capture by Local Officials

C. BAASCH TO ST. GEORGE FOR TRIAL

Revenue Men Seize Craft Off Wolves in Bay of Fundy

Seizure of 190 ten-gallon tins of what is thought to be alcohol and valued at \$40,000, wholesale price, was made late yesterday afternoon by local revenue and customs officers when they captured a high powered motor boat a few miles off the Wolves. Charles Baasch, who was aboard the boat at the time, was placed on the government patrol boat and he and the "wet goods" were brought to the city. He was handed over to the detectives and held for C. B. Lockhart, collector of customs, on a charge of smuggling liquor into Canada.

TAKEN TO ST. GEORGE. This morning Constable Goodrich arrived from St. George and Baasch was taken there to undergo preliminary hearing in connection with the charge. E. J. Henneberry, W. A. Ross, local barristers, have been retained to defend him. It is said that when the government patrol sighted the motor boat Baasch made a dash to get away but the propeller of the boat caught in some fish nets and slowed the boat down.

PLACED IN WAREHOUSE. The seized goods were placed in Pooles warehouse, Nelson street, last evening and Baasch spent the night in a cell at police headquarters. As St. George is the nearest court point to where the capture was made the hearing must take place there.

About 3 p. m. when the Government patrol boat was cruising in the bay off Partridge Island, a large light grey painted motor boat was sighted near the officers on the patrol boat soon caught up to her. On making an investigation they found Baasch in charge with a large quantity of liquor on board. The boat and cargo were seized and brought into port, arriving here about 4:30 o'clock. On notification, Sergeant Detective Power with Detective Bidlicomb appeared on the scene at 5 o'clock and Baasch was handed over to them by the revenue officers with the request that he be held at police headquarters until further instructions were received from the collector of customs. After the alcohol had been discharged from the motor boat and placed in the warehouse, the boat was taken to the place where the Government patrol boat is moored near the East Side ferry dock and is now under guard of Government officials.

One for Orphans and One to Roman Catholic Bishop

Regan, K. C., was proctor. Mrs. Sarah Forrester was named executrix of the estate of James Forrester, who left personal property valued at \$2,468. T. P. Regan, K. C., was proctor.

In the matter of the estate of the late James Sullivan, letters testamentary were granted to James Sullivan as executor. The estate consisted of \$700 realty and \$840 personalty. G. H. V. Belves, K. C., was proctor. Letters of administration were granted to G. Bruce Burpee in the matter of the estate of Marion Jean Gilbert, who left personal property valued at \$750. C. F. Inches, K. C., was proctor. Percy Bannister was appointed administrator of the estate of Quince W. Bannister, personally \$760. P. C. Quinn was proctor. Letters of administration were issued to Mrs. Hannah E. Robinson in the matter of the estate of the late T. Allan Robinson, personally \$600. C. H. Ferguson was proctor.

RESIGNS AS HEALTH BOARD SOLICITOR

Col. W. H. Harrison, M. L. A., Retires from Position—Board to Meet Monday

Colonel W. H. Harrison, M.L.A., has resigned the position of solicitor to the Saint John sub-district Board of Health to which he was appointed few weeks ago in succession to the late Mr. Roy Campbell. During the period under which Mr. Harrison held the health board solicitorship he was not called upon to take action in cases of infection of the Health Act, as the board has not had any cases to report. The regular meeting of the Sub-district Board of Health is to be held next Monday afternoon, and it is understood one of the principal items of business will be the appointment of a new solicitor. Important matters pertaining to the milk situation will also be introduced. It is said evidence is being accumulated pertaining to pasteurization and Grade A milk regulations which may engage the services of a lawyer soon.

DUTIES ENLARGED

F. J. McInerney Supervises Amusement Tax as Well as Being Censor's Chairman

Fred J. McInerney of Saint John, chairman of the board of motion picture censors, will have general supervision of the collection of the amusement tax in New Brunswick and the inspection of theatres, etc. under his appointment as inspector announced a few days ago. He still retains the appointment as inspector of the various parts of the province. The appointment is made under the provisions of the act passed at the last session of the Legislature which extends the amusement tax to bowling alleys, pool rooms and other amusement places not included previously.

IS FREED OF CHARGE

Hyman Slovitt Acquitted in the County Court Under Speedy Trials

Hyman Slovitt was tried before Judge J. A. Barry in the County Court yesterday under the Speedy Trials Act on the charge of receiving stolen goods knowing them to have been stolen, and was acquitted of the charge. E. J. Henneberry and W. A. Ross appeared for the defence.

Dr. W. P. Broderick returned to the city yesterday after attending a meeting of the masters of the fourth degree, Knights of Columbus, at Ottawa. Dr. Broderick said that affairs in connection with the order in Canada were discussed at the gathering.

It was learned today that the local Liberal executive will hold a meeting next week, when plans will be made for the holding of the nominating convention at which two candidates will be chosen to contest the constituency of Saint John-Albert.
