Famous "Forbidden Face" Contract Bars Lon Chaney's "Ghost Photos" in The Phantom of the Opera

DISCOVERED! The first picture star ever heard of who doesn't want his picture in the papers! And more than that—neither executives at Universal City, nor the ubiquitous press agent, can give out his picture—because his contract forbids it! He's Lon Chaney, star of "The Phantom of the Opera," Carl Laemmle's Super-picture which is coming next week to the Imperial Theatre, working under the queerest contract ever devised.

At no time during the production was his picture, in the make-up of the weird creature he is playing, made public. In every scene photographed for publicity or lobby display in which Lon Chaney appears, the face has been "blacked out" by a patch, much as censored material was during the war. At no time was any screen actor other than one playing in the picture allowed on the set to see his make-up—and the actors in the production were pledged to secrecy.

PIERRE, S. D., Nov. 26.—For the last time big game hunters from every part of the country are gathered for the hitherto annual buffalo hunt on the "Scotty" Phillips ranch along the Missouri.

When the sport ends on December 12, it is expected that from the herd

of 1,000 which roams the 20,000 acres of the ranch, four hundred will be slain to be shipped into 25 states to form the piece de resistance at holiday dinners.

Three hundred Cheyenne Indians in full accoutrements take part in the 3-days' roven with which the Phillips Brothers open the hunt.

Before the party breaks up, three of the best cooks in Alabama will roast five buffaloes at a big barbecue to satisfy the appetites of the hunters.

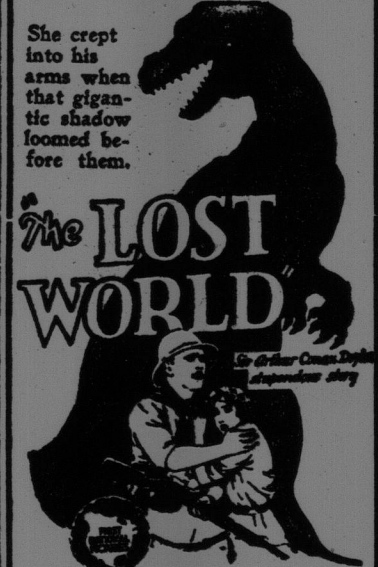

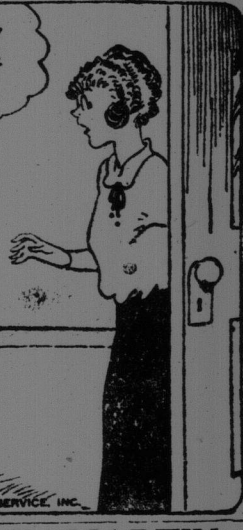
