

NINETEEN DEATHS.

There were nineteen deaths in the city during the week from the following causes: Pneumonia, two; broncho-pneumonia, two; burns, scalding, erysipelas, pneumonia, convulsions, myocarditis, septicaemia, encephalitis, mania, cancer of stomach, carcinoma of colon, arterio sclerosis, pernicious anaemia, pulmonary tuberculosis, cardiac decompensation, one each.

CITY ESTIMATES \$70,000 LESS THAN LAST YEAR

Reduction of \$23,000 in the Amount of Grants—Sewer and Hydrant Maintenance, Removed From General Assessment, Saves Another \$30,000—Comparison of Figures.

Although the estimate for city schools this year is some \$30,000 more than it was last year, the total estimates, as passed by the common council yesterday afternoon is nearly \$70,000 less than it was last year, the total estimates, as set principally by the decision of the council to let water revenue take care of the cost of maintenance of sewerage and fire hydrants, the turning down of the estimate for vocational schools, and a reduction of some \$28,000 in the amount of grants. Soldiers' Day expenses, which amounted to more than \$14,000 last year, is another item which affected a saving this year.

The estimates, which were passed in council at the afternoon session as recommended by the committee of the whole, with comparisons for last year were as follows:

It was decided that in future a statement of estimates for the harbor department should be presented at the council. Commissioner Bullock reported that this year the surplus, about \$18,000, had gone into the under-and-over-expended account.

Permission to build a runway over the tracks at West St. John from No. 4 shed to the new story on the Immigration building was granted the C. P. R. on condition that the fire underwriters and city engineer approve the plans.

The tender of Saab & Swanton for the work of deepening Newman Brook was accepted at \$4.45 a yard for rock and \$2.75 for earth excavation. Commissioner Frink was given authority to purchase a boiler for the rock crusher in Adelaide road at a cost of \$1,100, for which provision had been made in the estimates.

TEACHERS TO PLEAD FOR THE SCHOOL BOARD

The school teachers of the city held a meeting this morning and decided to appeal to city hall to back up the minutes made by the school board, which was cut down by the city council when the estimates were passed yesterday. The teachers' action in this regard is with a view to enabling the school board to pay the increased salaries asked and promised to the teachers last year.

In order to provide for the proposed increase the school board presented to the council an estimate of \$366,345, exclusive of repairs and interest and sinking fund charges, which was \$16,345 more than the amount allowed by law. The board asked the council to pass the amount so that legislation could be introduced for an additional amount. The council, however, passed the estimate for \$350,000, plus \$40,000 for repairs, \$50,000 for interest, \$2,150.89 sinking fund charges, and \$12,785.22 for the cost of collection, making a total of \$488,939.61.

After meeting this morning the teachers asked the city council for an opportunity to appear before them today to present their case, but were told that a hearing could not be given them today. Arrangements have been made, however, for the teachers to send a delegation before the city commissioners at twelve o'clock noon, on Monday.

A NEW SERVICE BETWEEN ST. JOHN AND ITALY

C. P. O. S. to Inaugurate a Direct Passenger and Freight Line.

A Canadian Press despatch from Montreal says: "A new direct passenger and freight service between Montreal and Italy, using St. John in the winter, has now been definitely decided upon by the C. P. O. S. An arrangement with the Navigazione Generale Italiana has been entered into which provides for a direct service from Montreal and Quebec (or St. John) to Genoa and Naples, the latter to be the terminal port.

"The N. G. I. will employ one of their finest passenger ships on the route in conjunction with a German ship, which has just been acquired by the C. P. O. S. and which will be renamed the Montreal."

SYRIAN WEDDING

Miss A. Corey Bride of Thomas Stevens Today.

A very pretty wedding, and one of unusual interest to the local Syrian residents, took place in the cathedral at 10.30 this morning when Miss Auphema Corey, daughter of Louis Corey, was united in marriage to Thomas Stevens (Saccine). The ceremony was performed by Rev. William Duke, who was assisted by Rev. Father Lewis, a Syrian priest, who came from Sydney, N. S., to attend the wedding. The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, looked charming in a white silk dress with veil and floral wreath, and carried a bridal bouquet of roses. She was attended by Mrs. Solomon Tobias, who was becomingly costumed in white georgette, with hat to match, and carried a bouquet of carnations. The groom was supported by M. S. Mitchell.

Following the ceremony, the bridal party drove in automobiles to the Syrian Protective Association hall in Brussels street, where a celebration was held in accordance with the Syrian custom. The spacious hall was beautifully decorated for the occasion and presented a very pretty appearance. This celebration will continue for some days in honor of the newly married. A bounteous wedding repast was served at noon, and in addition to a large number of local guests, there were a number present from Sydney, Halifax, Yarmouth, Fredericton, and Vermont, U. S. A. Moving pictures of the proceedings were taken this morning and will be shown to the event. Mr. and Mrs. Stevens will reside at 259 Brussels street. Following the wedding celebration, they will leave on a honeymoon trip to Montreal, Toronto, Buffalo and New York.

They were the recipients of a large number of magnificent presents from friends throughout the city as well as many in different parts of the maritime provinces.
