**Life of Women
War Workers
Is Described**
Mrs. P. R. Warren in Address to
Y. W. P. A. Tells of Work at
the Front

Vivid pictures of the life of the
women war workers in France and very
impressive details of the work of the Y.
W. C. A. in connection with them were
contained in the very fine address which
Mrs. P. R. Warren delivered before the
Young Women's Patriotic Association in
the Gormain street Baptist Institute last
night. The meeting was a special one
and the address was the chief feature of
it, but some routine business was trans-
acted and the grand announcement that
the association had added nearly \$3,000
to its funds by the sale of Victory bonds
was greeted with much enthusiasm.

The president, Miss Jessie Church was
in the chair and the first report given
was the treasurer's, following which the
correspondence was read. It contained
a donation of \$10 for the returned
soldiers' fund from Mrs. Stetson, a letter
from the Globe Winkler Company in
England referring to the gloves collected
for soldiers' waistscoats by the Y. W. P.
A. and an acknowledgment of \$25 for the
Siberian fund from Mrs. Creighton.
Miss Church announced that the fol-
lowing donations had been made: \$15
for the Blue Cross, \$5 for surgical in-
struments for a family suffering from
influenza, and that a loan of \$60 had
been made to a girl who needed money
to visit her brother, a returned soldier
who was dying in Toronto. The money
earned by road checking in August and
September, she said, amounted to \$112,
and the commission on the sale of Victo-
ry bonds by the association members to
nearly \$3,000. Two \$50 bonds had
been purchased for the association it-
self. The activities planned included a
Wednesday evening spaghnum moss
circle and the maintaining of the work
of the Seamen's Institute cabin. Vol-
unteers were asked for for both of these
activities and it was decided to comply
with a request to provide an entertain-
ment for the Red Triangle Club two
weeks after Christmas.

Mrs. Philip Warren was very grace-
fully introduced by Miss Church who in
doing so presented Mrs. Warren a hand-
some bouquet of carnations.

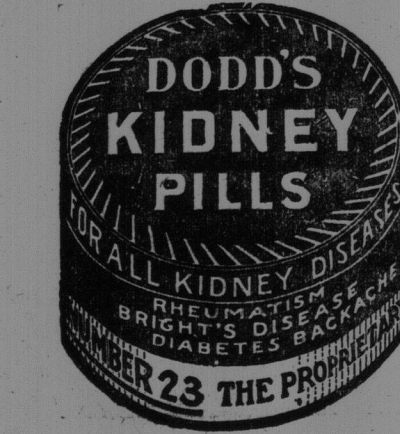
Mrs. Warren is just returning to

QUINN WHARE IS SOLD BY CITY TO GEORGE A. DICK

The city council, yesterday afternoon,
sold to George Dick for \$10,700 the
city's portion of the wharf property in
Sidney ward, known as the Quinn prop-
erty. The commissioner of harbors and
ferries announced there was only one ten-
der, that of Mr. Dick, which was for
\$10,000 but subsequently the commis-
sioner secured an advance on that bid
from him.

During the meeting his worship re-
ceived a telegram from A. P. Barnhill,
C. N. R. director, announcing that the
railway directors would arrive in St.
John on Friday, probably at noon, and
would remain in the city Saturday and
Sunday.

The mayor and all members were pres-
ent. The report of the committee of
George Dick the privilege of placing
a launch wagon on a site near the west
side docks, the rental of \$10 monthly.

Departmental payments for the month
of November were as follows: Treasury
department, \$440.08; public safety, \$8-
61.54; public works, \$828.76; water and
sewerage, \$1,468.94; harbors, ferries and
public lands, \$3,291.22. Other payments
for the month amounted to \$184,709.98.

RESULTS FROM LAST FRENCH LIBERATION LOAN.

Paris, Dec. 3.—(British Wireless Ser-

Up to last night, the minister asserted,
the combination showed subscriptions
amounting to 27,500,000 francs, nor-
mal capital or actually 19,750,000 francs,
to which the bank of France had contrib-
uted 12,000,000 francs.
