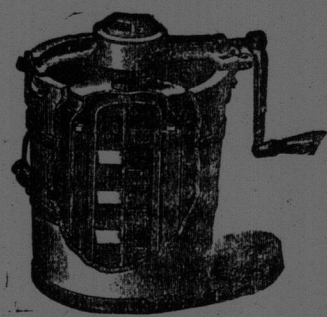

SHY, MODEST
AND QUIET IS
FUTURE KING

Prince of Wales Will Attain
His Legal Majority
This Month

HIS OWN ESTABLISHMENT

Will Be His Own Master and
Control Income of More Than
Half Million Dollars a Year—
Speculation as to His Bride

(Times' Special Correspondence)
London, May 25.—Curious is the contrast that might be drawn between the approaching legal coming of age of the Prince of Wales and the similar event in the life of his grandfather the late King Edward. The future ruler of the greatest of empires is a shy, rather quiet, modest but lovable youth who has captured the hearts of all his subjects-to-be; the late king, when he reached the age of eighteen, was already a man of the world, going the pace in accordance with the Victorian idea of the proper progress of every scion of a rich and powerful family.

It remains to be seen, of course, whether or not the present prince will blossom out into a more gay youth with the loosening of the maternal apron strings to which he has been securely tied in the past. On the 22nd of next month he will reach the mature age of eighteen—his legal majority—and thenceforth he will be his own master. Undoubtedly he still will be in daily and hourly receipt of motherly and fatherly advice, and will be duly warned of the pitfalls that exist for an heir to the British throne. But legally he will be free to disregard all advice and lead his own life.

Society, as well as the people-in-the-street, await with keen interest some evidence of the real youth who, up to the present time, has been carefully shielded from temptations. To begin with, the prince will have his own "establishment." For the present it is intended that a suite of rooms shall be set aside for him at Buckingham Palace and that he shall continue to occupy the suite that was some time ago set apart for him at Windsor. In King Edward's case, Marlborough House was assigned to his use, but at the present time Queen Alexandra is quartered there and the king and queen do not feel that they are justified in displacing her. Eventually, however, probably when he marries, the Prince of Wales will move into Marlborough House where he can have the seclusion and privacy dear to the heart of every man.

In addition to a separate suite at Buckingham Palace and at Windsor the prince will have his own staff of servants, a governor of his household and at least a few equerries. He might, if he wished, appoint tradesmen for every one of his wants, from cigarettes to motor cars, but for the present it is intended that the dealers who shall be permitted to sport the three feather crest of the prince shall be strictly limited and shall slowly grow with his increasing wants.

Although the prince will immediately become master of an enormous annual income, he will spend but a small part of it, the rest accumulating until he has need for it. The exact amount of money that flows into his purse varies from year to year, but it is always well over \$200,000. From his Duchy of Cornwall property alone there is a yearly yield of \$400,000, which is considerably augmented by government grants. The latter will be increased during the next few years especially when he takes unto himself a wife.

As to a Bride
Naturally there is considerable speculation as to the identity of the future wife of the prince. A man who is an intimate friend of both the king and queen recently told the writer that he did not think either of the parents of the prince had formed any opinion as to the suitable mate for their son. Of course it is largely a matter of state, and the prince's hand will be bestowed, and as it may seem, where it will accomplish the most good. There is in existence a pretty story of a youthful love affair involving the prince and the Grand Duchess Olga, daughter of the Czar of Russia, but there is no more foundation for this than a few gossamer tales cast by the prince upon his comely little cousin when they met for the second time in their lives about two years ago.

Princess Victoria, daughter of the Kaiser, who might be a match of bringing about the rapprochement of England and Germany, for which the politicians of the former country have been so long sighing, is unfortunately too old to be considered.

IMPORTANT MATTERS
DECIDED UPON BY
THE COMMON COUNCIL

Re-Organization of Departments—
Street Work—Money for Band
Concerts

The proposed reorganization of the city engineer's department with the appointment of George N. Hatfield as road engineer, with authority over street work and of David Doig as superintendent of water and sewerage with full control over the distribution system, was adopted by the common council yesterday afternoon. The mayor's opposition to Mr. Doig's appointment was the only thing to disturb the unanimity with which the charges were approved.

Mayor Prisk reported for the finance department and the council adopted his recommendations including the payment of the usual accounts, printing 300 copies of the law, granting \$700 for band concerts and \$300 for entertaining the British visitors next week.

The council approved the recommendations of Commissioner Agar that the north side of Main street from Acadia street to Paradise row and thence to Foundry lane be paved with granite blocks; that King street be paved with granite blocks between, and for eighteen inches on each side of the car tracks, the balance macadamized; and concrete gutters be placed in the street between the car tracks and the office of road engineer be created and assistant engineer G. N. Hatfield be appointed to fill it, and that P. J. Dooby be given permission to place an illuminated sign over his store in Prince William street.

His recommendation that Charlotte street be paved with asphalt between the south side of King square and the south side of Union street, taking in the present sidewalk between the north and south sides of King square, was laid over until the next meeting.

The commissioner of water and sewerage was authorized to install a dozen new hydrants.

The report of the commissioner of water and sewerage was adopted. It included a new outline of the engineer's duties, limiting their duties by the amount of work given to the new appointees, the appointment of David Doig as superintendent of water and sewerage, with outline of his duties and that catch basins be placed in Princess and Germain streets.

Commissioner Schofield's recommendations that Mrs. Elizabeth Marsh be granted a renewal lease of a lot in Guys ward and that all advertising signs be removed from city wharves were adopted.

An invitation to attend the first service in celebration of the festival of St. John the Baptist in the Mission church was sent to a committee.

A communication from D. Mullin, K.C., asking for compensation for Manasseh Hagan for injuries received at No. 4 warehouse, was referred to the commissioner of harbors, the city engineer and the recorder.

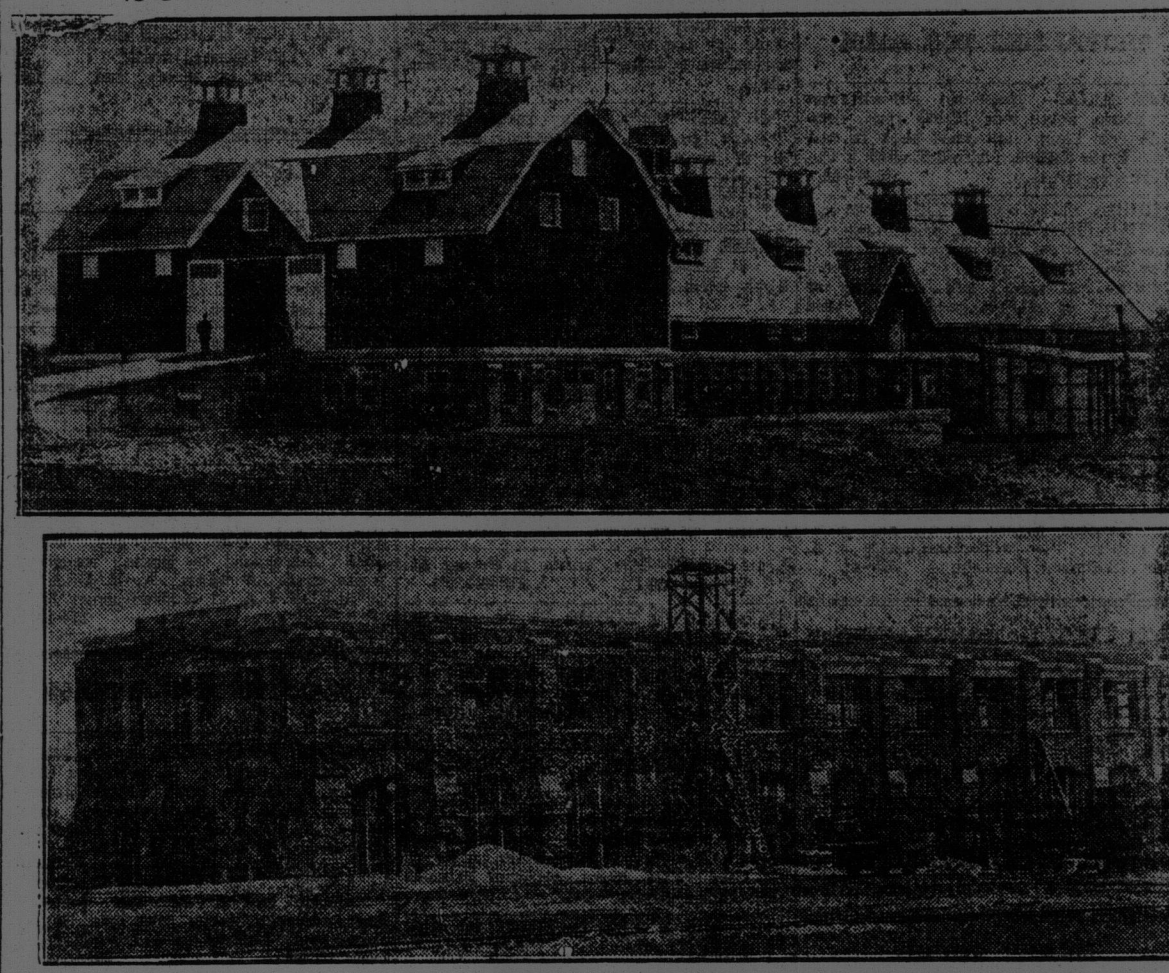
A petition asking for the removal of encumbrances from Market Square, West End, was referred to the commissioner of public works.

R. O'Brien and W. M. Jarvis were re-appointed commissioners of the Free Public Library.

The mayor and commissioners Schofield and Wigney were appointed to co-operate with the board of trade in arranging for the entertainment of the British visitors.

HIS THREE CHILDREN DIE
AS HE FACES TRIAL ON
CHARGE OF EMBEZZLEMENT

Bedford, June 7.—A painful and dramatic scene occurred in the criminal court here at the trial of a cashier named Emil Bruck, who was arrested at the instance of his employers, Messrs. Schwarz & Co., for having misappropriated about \$250.

While he was awaiting trial his three young children all died of measles within twenty-four hours, and at the opening of the case the prosecutor, Herr Schwarz, informed the judge that, out of consideration for this, the firm had decided to withdraw the charge, and asked for the acquittal of the prisoner.

Bruck, who had not been informed of what had happened at home while he was in prison, was so overcome that he swooned in the dock. As soon as he regained consciousness the court ordered his immediate release.

ARMED RAILWAY GUARD
SUDDENLY LOSES MIND;
REIGN OF TERROR FOLLOWS

London, June 7.—A tragic affair is reported from Hull. Isaac Jackson, a railway guard, suddenly went out of his mind and, taking a loaded double-barrelled gun, pointed it at a young man named Bennett, who was talking to him. Bennett closed with Jackson and the gun went off, Bennett being wounded in the leg. Bennett ran for the police, and the demented man meanwhile locked himself in his house, and for a time defied all efforts to arrest him.

Eventually Police-constables Piercy and Izard got to him, but Jackson opened fire upon them. Piercy was wounded in the region of the heart and right arm, and Izard also in the right arm. Piercy was found to be seriously injured and was taken to an infirmary. Izard was also treated at the institution, but was allowed to be taken home. Meanwhile, Jackson's house had been surrounded by several policemen under Inspector Dicken-son, and after a time, with Police-constable Lambert using an oven shelf as shield, and assisted by David Reed, an ex-footballer, the police rushed the house. On entering the kitchen a shocking sight confronted them. Jackson was found lying on the floor with his face practically blown to pieces. At the inquest the coroner remarked that Jackson was no doubt mad with drink, and the jury returned a verdict of suicide while of unsound mind.
