Nationalists in Revolt Again Over
Navy Matter — Lack of Firm
Leadership

Ottawa, Oct. 16—Conflicting counsels and ambitions within the cabinet, too much ministerial junketing, and too frequent as sences of ministers from the capital during the past six months, together with the lack of firm and bold feadership, have produced a most unedifying political situation on Parliament Hill

Today the vacillation and hesitation of the government with regard to the naval question and the calling of parliament is more pronounced than ever. Two days ago the ministry promised to announce at once the date of the assembling of parliament, and hints at Nov. 21 as the date of opening were given out.

Since then the cabinet has met twice and now the indications are that a further breathing space will be found necessary and the calling of parliament will be delayed until January. Outside of the fact that even the routine business of departments are away in arrears, the vital question of the naval proposals for the centing session is still unsolved.
