Count Loses His Ear in Savage Sabre Deal—The Don Quixote of The Austrian Nobility

Count Adalbert Sternberg, who has just shed off the left ear of Count Joseph Karolyi, at Maribor, in a particularly savage sabre duel, is one of the most extraordinary figures in Austrian life. He merits some attention in the states, owing to his pronounced hostility to everything American, the consequence of a stay of some months in the United States. He had challenged Count Joseph Karolyi, who is a son of the former Austrian Ambassador in London, for leaving in the national legislature at Budapest spoken disparagingly of the Austrian army, as compared with that of Hungary.

Count Adalbert Sternberg's championship of the Austrian army is all the more noteworthy, owing to the fact that some years ago he was not only deprived of his commission as an Austrian cavalry officer on the reserve list, but was even made the object of a general order on the part of the minister of war to the effect that he was to be removed from the list of officers on the reserve list.

James Lowell received a tremendous ovation. He dealt very fully with the arguments of the Conservatives against reciprocity. Rev. J. J. McCaskill was given a very attentive hearing and demonstrated the benefits that would come to Canada when reciprocity comes into force.

When Hon. Dr. Pugsley rose he was greeted with hearty cheers. He dealt with the arguments put forth by the Conservatives against reciprocity and proved to the satisfaction of every one present that the proposed trade agreement would be a great benefit to Canada. He spoke of the improvements at St. John, and set forth the policy of the Liberals in regard to branch line railways.

The meetings broke up with cheers for the king, the Liberal candidates and reciprocity. After the spirit shows at the meetings it is certain that James Lowell will be the representative of St. John county after this election.
