It is simply the use of sulphuric acid, of which four drops are diluted in three-fourths of a tumbler of water, to be adninistered to a grown person, and a smaller dose to children, at intervals not specified. The result is said to be oagulation of the diptheric mem brane and its ready removal by coughing. It is asserted that where the case is thus treated, and has not ad vanced to a nearly fatal termination, the patient recovers in almost every ace.-New York Illustrated


